Extraordinary acts of kindness recognised

This year, Wigan Council joined forces with Tyldesley-based Complete Kindness CIC to offer residents the opportunity to enjoy reiki, mindful colouring sessions and a pay it forward café.

Kindness champions were nominated by residents from across the borough for their good deeds and were surprised with special treats as a thank you gift.

School children also joined the fun, getting involved to spread the joy by painting rocks adorned with positive affirmations on them and

Community groups, such as All Ears Mental Health and Happy Smiles CIC, also played their part by spreading the kindness vibes and we are really pleased that the kindness will continue all year long!

Hundreds of affordable homes on target

Wigan Council's programme to create affordable homes for families across the borough is forecast to have a record year.

Around 450 homes are expected to have been completed for the 2022/23 financial year, surpassing the target of 338.

The local authority works alongside registered housing providers and house builders, and has its own direct delivery scheme to

boost housing supply and provide affordable options for residents.

> The programme includes a mix of bungalows, houses and apartments, a proportion of which are specialist or supported housing.

Locations of the affordable housing schemes include the site of the former Pemberton Primary School, Waterside Point, Wharfdale, York Street in Leigh and Orrell Gardens.

Borough superstar athlete Keely Hodgkinson is set to become one of the next recipients of a Believe Star and be added to the illustrious Walk of Fame.

The Olympic medallist, who continues to break records all over the world, will be honoured later in 2023.

The 800m runner joins her coach, mentor and fellow Olympian Jenny Meadows as a recipient of a star.

Councillor David Molyneux MBE, said: "Keely is a genuine world superstar who does our entire borough proud each time she competes.

"She has already achieved so much at a young age and we're excited to see what's to come in what promises to be an amazing career."







Be Well journey's valued contribution

Wigan Borough's growing Be Well leisure and wellbeing movement delivered a social value of £13.46m last year, new statistics reveal.

Seven local council-run leisure centres had well over a million combined visits in 2022 - boosting the health and fitness of tens of thousands of residents.

Figures show Be Well's wide-ranging activity in the local community also contributed to a happier, healthier borough - as well as reducing the strain on health services.

Councillor David Molyneux MBE, Leader of Wigan Council, said: "The goal of our Be Well movement is to help residents live healthier, happier lives and we're proud of the massive positive impact that's being made by our teams across our borough.

"By encouraging more and more people to get active and make better lifestyle choices, we're improving people's physical and mental health and also helping to reduce the burden on our underpressure NHS."

The Social Value Calculator developed by 4Global, Sheffield

Be Well

Hallam University and Experian - attempts to quantify the impact of sports and physical activities

on communities in monetary terms, factoring in estimated savings to

health services as well as the positive impact on people's happiness.

According to the model, Be Well improved the subjective wellbeing of Wigan Borough residents to the tune of £7.29m last year while providing a value of £3.3m in terms of social and community development.

Meanwhile, its impact on the physical and mental health of residents was measured as £2.76m.

Tackling litter with a fresh focus



New plans to refocus Wigan Council's efforts to tackle littering and fly-tipping have been given the green light.

Removing litter and fly-tipping costs the council an estimated £4m a year, which could be much better spent delivering services and improving our borough.

Council teams are keen to work with our communities, schools and organisations to help shape the strategy so keep an eye out for engagement events and opportunities in the coming months.

Service manager for streetscene, Matt Kelly, said: "There are lots of different strands to this campaign, from tackling cigarette butts to fly-tipping enforcement, along with supporting our incredible litterpicking volunteers.

"We all have a responsibility for keeping our borough clean and tidy. We hope that by educating and engaging with people we will be able to work with communities across the borough."

Voter ID is new thing to remember



New rules requiring voters to show photo identification will come into play for the first time for the upcoming local elections.

It means residents will need to show valid ID – such as a passport, driving licence, blue badge or travel cards, among others – at polling stations on Thursday, May 4.

If you don't have an accepted form of ID, or you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you, you can apply for a voter authority certificate.

Gearing up for the all-out elections

Wigan Council's local elections will take on a different form this year, with each of the 75 seats up for grabs.

This is following the changes made to ward boundaries by the Local Government Boundary Commission for England (LGBCE) last year.

The vote will take place on Thursday, May 4 between 7am and 10pm, across the borough's 25 electoral wards. Three councillors will be elected in each ward. Usually, one councillor per ward is elected every three out of a four year period.

And it all comes as the worldfamous Wigan Casino's 50th anniversary approaches.

"It will truly showcase the unique history and incredible

range of musical genres our borough has embraced and called its own." explains Louisa Attaheri, assistant business partner for culture, arts and heritage.

"From jazz to Northern Soul, to pop and the brass band movement, the exhibition will offer something to everyone, and we hope to spark musical memories for all generations."

Throughout the year, the display at the Library Street location will change to reflect different musical themes and will play host to a packed schedule of small-scale gigs and events. For example, every three months it will evolve to cover stage and screen, theatre, cinema, festivals and finish with carnivals.

The exhibition space features five areas, with sound pods broadcasting local playlists. There is also an opportunity for families to pick up an instrument or two and make a start on a new musical journey or just enjoy making some noise.

"It is very dynamic and colourful, we're very excited." says exhibitions development officer Joan Livesey. "There is a mini-auditorium where we hold events and small

With it being a milestone anniversary for Northern Soul, visitors to Make Some Noise will be able to indulge in classic memorabilia from the world-famous scene, and the balcony that hosted famous DJs and live acts such as Jackie Wilson and Betty Wright will be recreated.

Given the current thriving music scene here in the borough. the exhibition will also sing the praises of the local bands making an impact on the national stage like chart-topping The Lathums. Stanleys, Lottery Winners, Flechettes and Rivver.

Fans of jazz – we are the host of the acclaimed International Jazz Festival. after all – will also be well catered for with the tunes of The Count Basie Orchestra. Maynard Ferguson, Bobby Shew. Horace Silver and Jools Holland and his Rhythm and Blues Orchestra, also on the playlists.

And who could forget classic names such as George

Formby, Georgie Fame, The Beat Boys, The Verve and Starsailor? Well, not us, as the stories behind them all feature.

The exhibition is at the Museum of Wigan Life and will run through until January next year.

We'll leave the last word to Joan: "Music is so important to our borough and we've had such a depth of talent down the years. This is really something special."

Haigh, ho... Let's go!

Earlier this year it was announced Wigan Council's bid to the Levelling Up Fund (LUF) had been successful. The Borough Life team visited the historic hall to hear about what this means for the site's masterplan and what everyone can expect to see next.

It's a crisp January morning and the picturesque facades of Haigh Hall are basking in the winter sun.

The clear skies and fine weather reflect the mood as key figures behind the much-loved site's masterplan gather outside the grand entrance.

The last 48 hours have been a whirlwind of activity after it was confirmed that £20m had been allocated by central government to help with the vision to restore the hall and create a visitor destination of cultural significance.

Along with significant match funding from Wigan Council and extra cash from the National Lottery Heritage scheme, it's the missing piece of the financial jigsaw.

Councillor Chris Ready (pictured below) is grinning from ear-to-ear.

"We're all ecstatic about it – 20 million reasons for us all to be happy today," he tell us. "There's been so much work gone into this over the years, it has been a great partnership with the community.

"With the funding from the council, the project will see more than £37m of investment."

With creative directors Al and Al at the helm, the masterplan will see the hall restored and become a beacon for arts, culture, heritage and the environment.

The wider site will provide a welcoming space for visitors to relax and enjoy the beauty of the Woodland Park.

It will also become a focal point for the local economy, providing employment and training opportunities.

"The hall is so precious to everyone in the borough, it was important to us that the plans are driven by the community," explain Al and Al.

Heritage centrepiece a nod to mining history

Plans to install a stunning new gate at Haigh's Mowpin Lodge – which features a shovel and pickaxe motif – are taking shape.

Following a public vote, the design that recognises Haigh's 900-year mining history was chosen last year from three options created by Al and Al.

The concept is being brought to life by local company Lost Art Limited who specialise in repairing, restoring, reproducing and reinstating historic landscape furnishings. Watch this space for further updates.

Visitors will be able to explore the borough's rich heritage and history across the hall's five floors.

From an underground cinema experience in the cellars to stargazing on the rooftop terrace, with stunning artwork from Theodore Major on the floors in between, it promises to be an incredible experience.

'This is the jewel in the crown for us.'

"Along with the lottery funding, it's going to be massive for the entire Woodland Park," adds Councillor Ready, who is cabinet lead member for communities.

We listened to what everyone had said and from that we went away and came up with this masterplan that responded to everyone's hopes and dreams. People are so passionate about Haigh and have such strong family memories.

The first thing that residents will see is the external fabric of the hall being regenerated.

We know that Haigh Hall and the wider Woodland Park are so popular and much loved by everyone. We get hundreds of thousands visiting every year, this new masterplan will transform Haigh Hall into a destination of national significance with culture on every floor.

Cabinet commits to further bids

Wigan Council will submit further LUF bids if permitted to do so in further rounds after missing out on its Leigh and Ashton-in-Makerfield applications, it has been confirmed.

The council is now waiting on further information from central government on the next round of LUF and any changes to entry criteria.

Speaking at a recent cabinet meeting, Council Leader David Molyneux MBE (pictured), said: "As much as I'm very pleased about the Haigh bid – we're going again and whatever we need to do (for Leigh and Ashton), we'll do it and make sure we're successful with those further bids."

Future high street plans in Ashton

Central government's High Streets Taskforce visited Ashton in 2022 and despite not being granted levelling up funding in the latest round, Wigan Council has committed to delivering the 'Plan for Ashton'. Further details are expected later in 2023.

Civic Centre revamp

Proposals to transform Wigan's civic centre building into a business innovation hub are under consideration. Further details are expected very soon so definitely one to look out for!

Library and recreation area funding boost

In late 2022, the town hall confirmed funding received from housing developers had been approved for improvements projects for Golborne library and the popular Golborne Bonc recreation area. These works are underway and will progress through 2023.

It's a hard job, but it's the best

Andrea Jukes is one of the borough's longest serving foster carers, dedicating more than a decade to supporting local children and families.

Here, in her own words, she reveals the inspiration behind taking up the role, its challenges and the joy it has brought her.

I always remember my mum talking about how she wished she could become a foster carer.

She never had the room, or opportunity, to do it, but it always stuck with me.

I've always been good with children. I was the eldest of three, so I was often the babysitter growing up and I went to America after university and worked as an au pair.

It was more about living in a different country and the new experiences than it was about wanting to take care of children, but it's interesting when I look back and think that's what I decided to do.

Years later it was only when a friend was looking into becoming a foster carer, and asked me for a reference, that I started to consider it.

I went home and discussed it with my husband, Andrew, and everything fell into place at the right time. I worked at a bank but there had been a lot of changes, so I asked, and was accepted, for voluntary redundancy. Andrew and I both completed the foster carer training, although he chose to keep his job, so I take main responsibility.

Our two sons, Ben (20) and Tom (23), were aged nine and 12 at that time, so of course we discussed it with them.

They were both really happy. Although I don't think any of us realised how intense it might become at times, the boys saw it as having a new brother or sister.

We decided we would only take young children as we thought it could be difficult for them having children of the same age living in our house.

When the first child came to live with us, it was understandably very strange, and I think we were all a bit anxious.

You never really know what each individual child's needs are and it was a really quick learning curve.

Even now, I always hope that the children will fit in with our family, and sometimes they do and sometimes they don't.

Over the years I think we've fostered around 40 children, some for several years, some for very short periods.

I've learned that you can always find something they're interested in to help get to know each other.

I've also discovered the importance of having routines and boundaries. Some of the children who come to us might not have had many in place before but children need them. Over the years I think we've fostered around 40 children, some for several years, some for very short periods

One young person told me he really appreciated those boundaries as he knew it meant we cared about him, because we wanted to keep him safe.

The most common questions we get asked are: "How do you not get attached to the children? Isn't it hard when they move on?"

Of course, you do get attached, especially if they've stayed with you for a number of years. When one of our first foster children was eventually adopted, and we didn't know whether we would be able to keep in touch with them, it was very hard.

It remains difficult trying to process that a child has moved on, even though that is ultimately the aim, and usually a very positive thing.

Your training helps and after a while you develop your mindset. We always compare it to if you had to suddenly look after a friend's child, if they had to go into hospital, for example.

You'd know that the child wouldn't be with you forever, so you approach it in that way.

One highlight is when you see a child returning to their birth family and you know you've played a part in making that possible. We've kept in touch with nearly all of the children we've looked after.

Lots of ours are in high school and doing really well. It's exciting to follow their journeys. It means so much to us that we're still in their lives.

Tom and his partner Megan are now going through the training

to become foster carers. They were always a massive help when they lived with us and it's lovely to think they've been inspired to do the same.

To be a good foster carer I would say you need to have empathy for others, be very patient, open, and honest, and to know when to bite your tongue!

Make the most of the good days and be prepared for the bad days.

Being a foster carer is the hardest job I've ever had, but it's also the best job.

A Borough Life birthday!

Back in spring 2003, the very first Borough Life dropped onto your doormats. To mark this special anniversary, we have taken a closer look at some of our early editions on the lookout for hot topics, familiar faces or surprises from 20 years ago.

How BL was born

The magazine's origin can be traced back to a series of citizens' panels set up by the council to feedback on important issues.

The readers' letters pages in the early editions (yes, it is hard to imagine a world not dominated by e-mail and social media) suggested residents welcomed the new magazine format and its sense of community.

Setting the scene

Unbeknown to everyone across the borough, we were heading for a summer heatwave that was Britain's hottest for more than a decade.

David Beckham was on the verge of signing for Real Madrid, iTunes was launched by Apple and social media website Myspace was introduced.

Here in Wigan Borough, the features in the first year of Borough Life provide an insight into causes for celebration and concern back then.

And many of the themes remain important to us today.

Recycling

The start of 2003 saw the trial of the borough's very first recycling scheme, when a third of the borough's residents received separate bags for their waste-paper collections.

The successful pilot was rolled out across all of our communities by the end of the year, with glass collections following in 2004.

In addition, we now collect garden and food waste, cans, tins, plastic pots and tubs, aerosols and aluminium foil for recycling, run recycling schemes for schools, and accept numerous additional items at our recycling centres.

In the UK, recycling is now estimated to save more than 18 million tonnes of CO2 a year, the equivalent benefit to the environment of taking five million cars off the roads.

Young voices

The behaviour of local young people was both celebrated and a subject for discussion in 2003.

The first few editions of Borough Life drew attention to some of our young successful sporting heroes, a tradition we've been proud to continue at our annual Believe Sports Awards. Young people across the borough elected their first ever representatives to the UK Youth Parliament, who discussed their hopes for the future in the magazine.

20 years on, the UK Youth Parliament continues to be supported by our thriving Wigan and Leigh Youth Cabinet group today; last year saw 20 young people putting themselves forward as candidates and an amazing 13,722 local young people casting votes.

Despite the number of young people getting involved in key crimes falling steadily in the early 2000s, teenagers were still perceived as a problem by many adults, with local police receiving an average 11,000 telephone calls per year about 'youth nuisance'.

"You only need to step off the kerb and someone will ring the police to complain about us," a young person complained to Borough Life in 2003.



Embracing culture, heritage and sport

In the years since 2003, discussions with young people - who have continued to tell us that they most want safe, informal, indoor places to go in their free time, ideally staffed by professional adults and with optional activities - have led to the opening of Wigan Youth Zone in 2013, and, this year, Leigh Youth Hub.

Sport

Our rich sporting heritage means the fortunes of our local teams play a big part in defining any period in our recent history.

Wigan Warriors were about to embark on their Super League VIII campaign that would end in Grand Final defeat against Bradford.

Latics were on their way to the Second Division Championship under Paul Jewell, while Leigh Centurions (no Leopards in sight, yet) had started their campaign in National League One.

Plans for Leigh Sports Village were unveiled in the first edition of the magazine, with residents invited to have their say on the new £75m complex before the planning application was submitted at the end of March.

Rugby League legend Billy Boston also celebrated the 50th anniversary of his move to Wigan in the magazine's second edition.

The early editors of Borough Life even attempted to unite Wigan and Leigh's rugby league fans, by inviting them to create their own 'Borough Dream Team' made





up of a combination of past and present players from each team.

Who would make a Warriors/ Leopards combined XIII in 2023?

Technology

Technology is often the biggest indicator of the passing of time.

The competition prizes in the early edition of the magazine highlight some of the most coveted tech of 2003, including a DVD player, CD microsystem and signed copies of Kym Marsh's latest CD (post Hear'Say).

In 2003, fewer than half of the borough's households were online and local libraries were essential in hosting free access to the internet for all local families, a service which is still available today.

In 2003, libraries also introduced us to the curiously named Xreferplus, a pioneering digital reference library of the time.

Not to be left behind, our parks services purchased a state-of-theart satellite GPS tool to help them monitor the condition of trees across the borough.

Enabling everyone to access digital technology remains an important priority for the borough today with many initiatives up and running including regular coding classes, a tablet lending library and the TechMates digital mentor scheme.

Green spaces

The borough's beautiful green spaces were valued and celebrated in 2003, as they are now.

20 years ago, the borough's flashes were officially named a local nature reserve and the millionth tree was planted at Viridor Wood at Bryn Gates.

The preservation of our green spaces continues today and will long into the future, with ambitious plans for Haigh Woodland Park and Pennington Flash.

Last year saw the declaration of the Flashes of Wigan and Leigh as a National Nature Reserve.

Famous faces

Some famous faces have graced the covers of Borough Life over the years and 2003 was no exception.

Coronation Street actress, Jennifer James, originally from Ashton, who played Rovers Return barmaid Geena, was interviewed for the first edition and Sir Ian McKellen (pictured) returned to his roots to open the

restored gardens at Mesnes Park and was covered in the third edition.

Clive Powell, 1960s RnB and jazz musician better known as Georgie Fame, originally from Leigh, featured in the fourth.

The borough itself has also become increasingly recognisable on screen.

In 2003, as TV companies began to realise the benefits of venturing outside London



to create television, the borough started to be recognised as a potentially exciting venue for filming. The BBC's hit drama of the day, Clocking Off, was filmed at Trencherfield Mill.

Take a close look at ITV's show, The Bay, and this year's Aviva Insurance and Quorn advertisements to see Wigan Borough's more recent appearances on the small screen.

So, what's new?

Our lookback on 20 years of Borough Life has provided some reassurance that some things haven't changed; we still celebrate our wonderful borough's achievements and sense of community.

And we try to keep the conversation going with our readers and embrace new channels and technology. We love our outdoor spaces, appreciate local culture, and like to recycle.

Above all, we hope Borough Life - with its original aims of providing clear information and celebrating the things that make Wigan Borough tick still relevant remains an enjoyable read. Here's to another 20 years!

A short hop under the railway bridge lands us at The Hideout on Queens Street. This stylish bar offers both the opportunity to have a cosy catch-up with friends over homemade coffee and cake to a wine tasting experience and an extensive list of cocktails.

For bar supervisor Jessica Mawdesley the Purple Flag highlights an exciting future for the borough.

The accreditation process requires town centres to meet a set of rigorous standards and identify further opportunities to enhance the evening and night-time offer.

Other locations to gain Purple Flag status in our region are Liverpool, Preston, Bury, Stockport and Chester.

Praise for safety campaign

Wigan's application – submitted in partnership between the council and town centre businesses and organisations – was commended in particular for its Safety of Women at Night (SWAN) initiative.

This has seen awareness activity (such as the Call It Out campaign), training initiatives and safety measures such as taxi marshals in town centres across the borough.

A pioneering partnership using the escapism of a cinema trip is providing respite for some of the borough's unsung heroes

We will have all benefitted from a dose of cinema therapy; the chance to switch-off, sit back and be whisked away to a different time, place or universe.

Now, thanks to the vision of Leigh Film Society (LFS), those who care for friends or relatives have a regular opportunity for vital rest and recuperation in front of the silver screen.

It's what the Carers Film Club is all about; utilising self-help benefits of a trip to the pictures and providing a break from potentially stressful situations.

"We launched the club back in 2020 and from day one we wanted carers to feel like they have ownership by making them part of the programming," explains Elizabeth Costello, LFS's development director and a driving force behind the initiative.



"We invited young carers to select films that were age appropriate and adult carers selected films we may have previously screened during our film society events."

Elizabeth provided a presentation to the council about the benefits of cinema therapy that sparked the partnership that now works to provide the Carers Film Club.



Open to all carers, the free screenings and facilities at the Film Factory in Leigh's Spinners Mill are designed to be accessible - with a row dedicated to wheelchair users - allowing carers to bring along the people they care for, if they wish.
