Better Use of Community Resources - Lindale Hall, Mosley Common

Asset Transfer of former Adult Services Centre to Community Hub

The Issues

- Adult Service Day Centre underused
- Operated by Adults Service paid caretaker offering limited activities
- Lack of community facilities in area no specific community building
- Statistically one of the most isolated areas within the borough
- Lots of community based services required but not available in the area
- Caretaker due to retire June 2016





The Journey

To provide a self-sustainable community hub to serve the whole community, retain current services and bring much needed new projects and activities for all the community under one roof including:

- Luncheon Club
- Educational courses
- Befriending group for socially isolated
- Meeting room hire
- Arts and drama club
- Children's services
- Exercise classes
- Educational courses
- Credit Union
- Breakfast & after -school club
- Craft/local produce fairs
- Community events

With our skills & expertise we are able to highlight capabilities of the community in managing and maintaining the centre

What was achieved

Beehive Community Group formed with members from local community

Transfer of asset to group – group membership now increased and working in partnership with local stakeholders and Mosley Common Community Group

Usage of asset increased from 15 to over 60 hours per week

Funds of £5,000 attracted to date

Income of £2000 generated within first 2 months of handover from a new range of activities including:

- Social activities, health and
- wellbeing activities and
- confidence building courses
- Community events
- Luncheon Clubs
- Exercise classes

To transfer Bowling Green facility to a local group managed by volunteers

Asset Transfer of Bowling Green and Pavillion

The Issues

- Part of the Councils Assets & Accommodation Savings Programme
- Council needs to save £???? a year from its sports pitch maintenance budget
- Lack of investment could lead to decline in the high quality of facilities
- No local authority funding available to undertake necessary improvements





The Journey

- The local bowling club wanted to improve the state of the Green and surrounding facilities. Consultation between local bowling clubs
- Expression of interest from several local bowling members to get together and form new group
- Formal Expression of Interest submitted for transfer of asset

Several members of our committee have been involved in the management of assets etc. of other organisations in a professional capacity and in a voluntary capacity. All have a lifetime of experience in the maintenance of their own properties and gardens. In addition, we have in our group expertise and knowledge of greenkeeping and running of bowling clubs

What was achieved

- Formation of new Group consisting of members of local bowling clubs -Membership of group increased now up to 40
- Increased usage of the Green and Pavilion outside of existing Bowling season
- Investment in to maintenance of the Green.
- Environmental improvements to surrounding landscape
- External funding being sought with support from Bowling Green Association
- Pursuing opportunities to Increase programme of activities to include: Young people, wider community members
