# WOMEN AT RISK OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

## 1.0 NATIONAL AND LOCAL CONTEXT

### 1.1 SAFETY AND JUSTICE: THE GOVERNMENT PROPOSALS ON DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

- Increasing the full range of accommodation options including refuge accommodation
- Providing advice and information to victims on how to get access to support services and legal protection

### 1.2 WIGAN'S DOMESTIC VIOLENCE STRATEGY

- Protection, Provision, Prevention, Promotion, Perpetrator Intervention
- Provision includes supported housing and floating support
- Action Plan: Increase support available to women when moving to long term accommodation

### 2.2 CURRENT LEVEL OF PROVISION: REGIONAL AND NATIONAL COMPARISON

Figures, supplied by the Office of the Deputy Prime Minister, showing the provision of Supporting People funded services, as at 31<sup>st</sup> March 2003, indicate that the number of units of accommodation based services and floating support within the Borough is lower than the regional and national average. However, the unit cost is significantly higher.

## WAVE

In 2003/4 Wave provided a refuge space to 42 families. Accommodation could not be provided to the remaining referrals for the following reasons:

- lack of space 110
- Inappropriate referral 83
- Male child over age of 14
- Severe mental health needs 29
- Severe drink dependency 31
- Severe drug dependency 28
- Refuge not appropriate for disability 2

### 3.4 SUPPORTING PEOPLE CLIENT RECORD DATA

Every Supporting People funded service (except for sheltered housing) is required to complete a client record form for each new service user. The aggregated data for women at risk is shown in the tables included in Appendix A. The key points from the data are outlined below:

- During the last 3 years between 163 and 225 women on an annual basis have a primary or secondary need which is domestic violence related (see Table 1)
- There are a range of secondary needs amongst those people with a primary need relating domestic violence, however those which have been most often present are homeless families and single homeless with support needs. (see Table 2) .

***The following data relates only to those women at risk as a primary need (between 147 and 209 annually over the last 3 years)***

- 6.5% of people of women fleeing violence accessing SP services are from BME communities which is significantly more than the BME population in the community (Table 3)
- Between 96% and 80% of women at risk of domestic violence accessed accommodation based services and the remainder accessed floating support (Table 4)
- A consistent pattern has emerged which shows that women at risk are mainly accessing services for the following groups: women at risk of domestic violence and homeless families (Table 5)
- A wide range of types of accommodation were occupied by women at risk prior to accessing SP services (Table 6)
- The key referral sources are housing; self referrals and voluntary agencies (Table 7)
- A minimal proportion of people require assistance under any of the following statutory framework with the exception of the homelessness legislation under which approximately 70% service users are entitled to assistance
  - Care management (Table 8)
  - Care Programme Approach (Table 9)
  - Probation Service or Youth Offending Team (Table 10)
  - Drug Intervention Programme (Table 11) – data not available 2006/7
  - Statutorily homeless and owed a main homeless duty (Table 12)

- Care Programme Approach (enhanced) (Table 13)
- Multi Agency Protection Panel (Table 14)
- Number of women at risk accessing SP services subject to the requirement of an Anti Social Behaviour Orders (Table 15) *No data available*
- Geographical location of the accommodation occupied by women at risk immediately prior to receiving support (Table 16)

### 3.6 CONSULTATION

#### Provider and stakeholder - 2004

- Lack of housing which is resulting in people staying in refuges for too long – impacts on women and the management of the refuge – people can be in the refuges for up to 12 months
- Lack of services for women moving on from refuges
- Lack of services and information for women from BME communities
- Condition of properties can be poor – different views about whether providers should paint rather than give decorating vouchers
- Housing is helping women to move to other areas away from their abusive partner: it needs working on, but they are attempting to change things. Now have housing support worker - it is starting to improve. They are giving people some kind of support for a short while then they move in.
- Lack of accommodation for wheelchair users
- Grant takes two weeks to be processed so need two rent free weeks as can't move in until furniture grant comes through
- Anybody perceived as too high a risk would be referred to homeless families services
- Lack of support for women who have moved on, especially for women rehoused to a new area, can make them go back to their abusive partner, although the percentage is low

#### Consultation – service users

- Gap - Drop in centre
- Gap - Outreach worker - want to be able to stay in touch with staff and other women (see letter)
- More places like this was the general feeling – some women wanted a creche so they could go to appointments

## 4.0 CURRENT PROVISION: ARE CURRENT SERVICES MEETING LOCAL NEEDS AND PRIORITIES?

### 4.1 ASSESSMENT AS AT MARCH 2005

The above data demonstrates that many women at risk of violence are staying in non-specialist accommodation and that current services do not meet the level of demand. Referral data for the refuges suggest high levels of unmet need. Consultation has also indicated that there is a gap in floating support.

Further needs analysis is required to find out the proportion of women moving on from the refuges/other supported housing who need support and the number of people living in ordinary housing needing a floating support service

In relation to the provision of refuge accommodation, we would seek to undertake a needs assessment in conjunction with other local authorities owing to the number of people who access services in other Boroughs

ODPM data shows that services have a high unit cost. This has occurred owing to the small size of both refuges; one of which is seeking to move to larger accommodation, which will reduce the unit cost. Detailed analysis will be undertaken as part of the review process.

The outcome data now available shows that 95.5% of women moved on from the refuge in a planned way with some people moving on to tenancies whilst others either returned home or stayed with family and friends

#### **5.1 GAPS – MARCH 2005**

The key **gaps** identified in services include

- ?Insufficient refuge spaces – further cross authority analysis required
- Lack of floating support for people moving on from refuges and women who have remained in the family home
- Insufficient appropriate services for women from BME communities
- Delays in accessing tenancies/ordinary housing for people to move on to from the refuge
- Services for women at risk of violence who have
  - severe drug and/or alcohol related problems,
  - severe mental health problems
  - male children over the age of 14 years old(are currently referred to homelessness section by refuges who often can not accommodate these groups)
- Services for women at risk of violence who are disabled and are wheelchair users

#### **5.2 PRIORITIES – MARCH 2005**

***2005/6 - Women at risk of domestic violence to be included in Priority Band 2 for Supporting People resources.***

- As high unit cost, potential for efficiency savings/reconfiguration will be considered as part of service review
- Develop floating support if funding available and recommendation of strategic review of floating support (Priority Band 2)
- Further needs assessment – see action plan below
