PEOPLE WITH MENTAL HEALTH PROBLEMS

1.0 NATIONAL AND LOCAL CONTEXT

1.1 NATIONAL SERVICE FRAMEWORK

The National Service Framework for Mental Health was issued in September 1999 and sets national standards, two of which are directly relevant to Supporting People: Standard 1 Mental Health Promotion and Standard 4& 5 Effective Services for People with Severe Mental Illness. The Local Implementation Plan for the NSF states (under standard 4& 5) that all services users assessed as requiring rehabilitation should receive access to education, training, occupational activity and social care support, including supported accommodation. The development and dissemination of an Accommodation Strategy was identified as an action point under this Standard.

1.2 BEST VALUE REVIEW OF MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

A Best Value Review of Mental Health Services has been undertaken during the last 12 months. In recognition of the lack of accommodation options available to people with mental health problems living in the Borough, it was decided that a subgroup should focus on accommodation and direct payments. The Supporting People Lead Officer led this group. One of the key objectives was to update the Mental Health Accommodation Strategy, which formed the basis of the Mental Health Section of the Shadow Supporting People Strategy developed in 2002.

The recommendations of the Best Value Review are outlined below:

- To ensure that a whole systems approach is adopted towards the provision of accommodation for people with mental health problems
- To identify if there is a need for additional units of nursing care within the Borough once the impact is known of a new crisis resolution service and the increased provision of supported accommodation/floating support
- To increase the supply of supported accommodation within the Borough
- To increase the supply of floating/visiting support
- To promote the social inclusion of people with mental health problems through ensuring that contracts for accommodation services includes requirements to assist service users to access employment education and training as appropriate
- To increase the availability of ordinary housing to enable people to move on to independent living
- To assess the need across the 5 Boroughs Mental Health Trust for services for people with the following needs:
 - ❑ Severe mental illness/challenging high risk behaviour
 - ❑ Young people with dual diagnosis (mental health and learning disability)
 - ❑ Acquired brain injury/organic mental disorder/learning disability

2.2 CURRENT LEVEL OF PROVISION: REGIONAL AND NATIONAL COMPARISON

(to be updated with data used in the refresh of the prioritisation framework)

ODPM Figures showing the provision of Supporting People funded services, as at 31st March 2003, indicate that the number of units of accommodation based services within the Borough is less than the regional and national average, whilst there is a higher level of floating support services. The floating support figures are misleading as although Wigan and Leigh Housing's floating support scheme has a primary client group classification of mental health, in reality it is a low level generic service rather than a specialist mental health service.

The level of grant is below the regional and national averages.

3.0 WHAT IS THE LEVEL OF NEED?

3.1 PREVALENCE FIGURES

Around 22.3% of the local population (24.8% women and 19.6% men) are estimated to have mental health problems. (Wigan Borough Health Survey 2001) Nationally this figure is 17% (19% women and 15% men)

3.4 ANALYSIS OF PROVIDER REFERRAL DATA/OUT OF BOROUGH RESEARCH

Details of referrals to supported housing scheme were obtained from Wigan Council, Richmond Fellowship and Making Space. Brookfield data covered the period April 2003 until October 2004 whilst Making Space's figures related to September 2003 until October 2004 and Richmond Fellowship's figures from July 2004 until October 2004. Most of the data supplied included details of initials and dates of birth in order to enable the removal of duplicates and thereby preventing double counting where possible.

3.5 SUPPORTING PEOPLE CLIENT RECORD DATA

Every Supporting People funded service (except for sheltered housing) is required to complete a client record form for each new service user. The aggregated data for people with mental health problems is shown in the tables included in Appendix A.

The key points from the data are outlined below:

- During the last 3 years between 144 and 163 people on an annual basis have a primary or secondary need which is mental health related (see Table 1)
- There are a range of secondary needs amongst those people with a primary need relating to mental health problems however those which have been most often present are single homeless with support needs; alcohol and drug problems (see Table 2).

The following data relates only to those people who have mental health problems as a primary need (between 120 and 87 annually over the last 3 years)

- 1.3% of people with mental health problems accessing SP services are from BME communities which is lower than the proportion of the community from BME groups (Table 3)
- There is a consistent pattern of between 61% - 81% annually accessing floating support services and the remaining people accommodation based services (Table 4)
- A consistent pattern has emerged which shows that people with mental health problems are accessing services for the following groups: people with mental health problems and homeless families. (Table 5)
- A wide range of types of accommodation were occupied by people with mental health problems prior to accessing SP services (Table 6)
- The majority of referrals are from the Community Mental Health Team, Social Services, Housing and self referrals. (Table 7)
- The following proportion of people require assistance under the following statutory

frameworks between April 2003 and March 2006 : Care Management (18%); CPA (58%); Homelessness (32%) CPA enhanced (37%)

3.7 CONSULTATION

Issues raised through consultation included

Provider Interview 2004

- Inadequate information on referrals although now improving
- Insufficient rehab - some people don't have daily living skills especially if have always lived with parents
- Floating support
- Need to enable people to move through the system

Consultation Event November 2004

- Inadequate provision of supported accommodation
- Need for short term accommodation based service at the south of the borough
- Lack of respite provision
- Lack of services for people with dual diagnosis – increasing problem of a person's drug misuse impacting on other service users
- One person felt that there needed to be the development of a "wet houses". Supporting individuals to address drug taking within a safe supportive environment, and supporting people to live more effectively with their dependency. Current ideas of rehab, did not work for many people, and therefore a safe environment, where people could live and work effectively with a drug dependency needs to be addressed, rather than simply putting people through rehab, who are not ready to address giving up their particular habit totally. This sounds quite radical, but the current system has not worked so far, and therefore people felt that other ways of dealing with addiction needed to be explored.

Service User Views

- Not enough schemes like ours, with support.
- There should be more information in hospital. – (another service user said that they have started doing that at Leigh Infirmary)
- We need someone on duty on the weekend, during the day. We only have a caretaker then, and because I can get quite anxious, I like to have someone to talk to.

4.0 CURRENT PROVISION: ARE CURRENT SERVICES MEETING LOCAL NEEDS AND PRIORITIES?

4.1 ASSESSMENT AS AT MARCH 2005

The above data demonstrates that services are being offered to those people with appropriate needs i.e. a high percentage are on the Care Programme Approach, a number of people have been either in hospital or residential care.

There is a significant level of under provision evidenced by the referral data and, occupancy figures. Comparative data also indicates under provision of units (and also grant per head of population if the funding for Wigan and Leigh's Housing Link Scheme is deducted). Difficulties with finding appropriate tenancies for people to move on to from supported housing exacerbates this problem.

The service review and best value review processes have enabled a local Provider in conjunction with the Supporting People Team and Stakeholders to look at reconfiguring an existing service. This will increase the level of provision of floating support, in the short

term, and hopefully increase the number of units of supported accommodation in the long term.

- Supported accommodation – long term and short term (south of the Borough)
- Floating support – especially for people with complex needs/requiring intensive levels of support
- Move on accommodation/access to tenancies
- Services for people who present a risk often as a result of substance misuse

5.2 PRIORITIES – MARCH 2005

2005/6 Services for people with mental health problems placed in Band 2

- Reconfigure existing project to provide additional units of floating support in the short term and additional provision of accommodation based services in the long term
- Support bid to Housing Corporation for capital for new accommodation based project (no new revenue required)
- Ability to meet the needs of people who present a risk will be considered as part of the development of the accommodation based service
