TEENAGE PARENTS

1.0 NATIONAL AND LOCAL CONTEXT

1.1 GOVERNMENT GUIDANCE

“All Lone Parents under the age of 18 who cannot live with family or a partner should be placed in supervised semi independent housing with support rather than an independent tenancy”. (need to reference)

Every Child Matters

The Government’s children and young people’s agenda is set out in “Every Child Matters” the aim being to draw all agencies together to deliver better services and support for all children to achieve the five key outcomes

- Being healthy
- Staying safe
- Enjoying and achieving
- Making a positive contribution
- Achieving economic wellbeing

Wigan has now produced its Children’s and Young Peoples Plan 2006 -09 which replaces and draws together and integrates a number of other plans and strategies, including Teenage Pregnancy (TP). It also acts as one strategic overarching plan for Children and Young People’s Services across the borough.

1.2 WIGAN’S TP STRATEGY

Wigan has achieved a 4.3% reduction in under-18 conception rates since the 1998 baseline. The national Performance Management of local Teenage Pregnancy (TP) strategies has graded Wigan as ‘Amber/Red’ area on the ‘Traffic Light’ assessment rating for progress towards the 2010 target (*i.e. a 50% reduction in under-18 conception rates*). This indicates the prospects for the future appear to be promising if progress can be accelerated, the overall progress of the local TP strategy in Wigan has been consistent.

2.2 CURRENT LEVEL OF PROVISION: REGIONAL AND NATIONAL COMPARISON

Figures, supplied by the Office of the Deputy Prime Minister, showing the provision of Supporting People funded services, as at 31st March 2003, indicate that the number of units of accommodation based services and floating support and the level of grant is higher than the regional and national average. However unit costs are lower, with the exception of the unit cost for accommodation based services (i.e Bamber Court) when compared to the national figure

3.1 PREVALENCE FIGURES (NEEDS CHECKING)

Office of National Statistics (ONS) data 2004 indicates that under 18 conception rates for England is 41.5 per 1000 girls aged 15-17. This rate represents an overall decline of 11.1% since the 1998 baseline year for the Teenage Pregnancy Strategy

As shown in the above table, only 3 applicants in 03/ 04 were refused access to the service. The reason in all cases was that the service did not meet the individual's support needs. However a high number of applications were withdrawn which requires further investigation. A similar pattern emerges in 2005/6 with no service users being refused but a significant number of people find withdraw their application or find alternative accommodation

3.6 CONSULTATION

Provider and Stakeholder Views (2004)

- Inappropriate level of staffing at Bamber Court (Provider) (TP Support Task Group)
- “The demand for housing in Wigan is quite high so the chances of getting what you want, in the area you want, in the time is quite remote and that is the biggest problem. It means that there is a lot of pressure on people to take hard to let properties and go to areas that they probably would not have done. Some areas are not suitable for a 17 year old with a baby” (Provider)
- Lack of affordable and good quality housing (Provider)
- Delays in getting appropriate move on although this has improved (Provider)
- Although the Government target is around under 18s being in unsupervised accommodation, there is concern about those people who are in the 18 to 24 year old age range needing floating support (Connexions)
- Insufficient information provided on the referral forms (Provider)
- Need to try to improve joint working for teenage parents in non specialist services using model developed at Bamber Court (supported housing for teenage parents).

One Stakeholder Response (2007)

- Still a lack of understanding about housing process and TPs often feel obliged to accept first property offered. A dedicated person is needed at housing to deal with TPs so everyone is given same info. Some are still told no chance until had baby whilst others are promised the earth then get no where- it's not consistent.
- Bamber is ideal but not enough places. Also need a similar provision for young couples i.e. small and only for under 24s with baby or pregnant
- Support is still needed for 18-20 yr olds as well as 16/17
- There are issues regarding perception of services so would be helpful to undertake some consultation.

- Possible reason for high number withdrawing application is that they are re housed whilst waiting for a place at Bamber. Also persuaded by family/partner/friends that it is too far from home. Also a lot want to be with partner and can't there so hang on hoping for property together
- Housing is an issue which comes up time and time again with TPs

Service User Views (2004)

- Lack of understanding about rights to housing
- Service users felt that there is a lack of information about available services and that some people didn't have confidence to access by themselves

Service User Views - Consultation at Time for U Event (2004)

- *Barriers to independence*
 - Lack of finance/financial difficulties
 - Not qualifying for benefits because of age
 - Waiting lists
 - Poor knowledge about their rights
 - Not understanding the system and not knowing where to go for advice and help
 - The attitude of the housing department feeling as if 'they weren't interested' or 'not bothered' trying to find them anywhere to live
- *Difficulties experienced living independently*
Often pregnant or nearing end of term when offered a house mean they will take the first thing that is offered to them. Many of those housed by Wigan Council are in properties in bad areas, having to face:-
 - Repairs to property
 - Problems from neighbours
 - Anti-Social Behaviour from other people
 - Rubbish clearance
 - Vandalism
 - Crime directed at them
 - Loneliness and isolation
- *Support that would help*
 - Having housing and benefit information specifically targeted at Teenage Parents
 - Information about their rights (some did not know they have an offer of 3 properties and just took first)
 - Advocacy support
 - Affordable and available child care
 - Befriending, more social activities and chances to meet other people

4.0 CURRENT PROVISION: ARE CURRENT SERVICES MEETING LOCAL NEEDS AND PRIORITIES?

4.1 ASSESSMENT AS AT MARCH 2005

Regional and national comparisons show that provision for teenage parents is above average. Local evidence confirms that there is adequate provision, as long as service users

are able to move on to independent tenancies from Bamber Court, thereby preventing it from becoming inappropriately “blocked”

The key issues relate to

- inadequate funding of the supported housing project which is resulting in the Provider have difficulty recruiting staff and being able to provide the level of support required by service users with complex needs. This is of concern to both the Provider and the Teenage Pregnancy Support Task Group
- availability of information about services/rights
- advocacy

5.0 GAPS AND PRIORITIES

5.1 GAPS – MARCH 2005

The key **gaps** in services identified at March 2005 include

- Insufficient funding for existing projects/Increased staffing required at Bamber Court
- Information/lack of understanding about how the housing allocation process works – teenage parents feel under pressures to take unsuitable properties
- Lack of assistance to find out about services
- Delays in accessing tenancies/move on accommodation
- Inadequate out of hours specialist provision– investigate the potential for additional assistance in the event that people with very high needs are being offered a service
- Insufficient provision of advocacy services
- TP Strategy concentrates on the needs of 16-17 year old, support is also needed for 18+ (link to homeless families section)

5.2 PRIORITIES – MARCH 2005

2005/6 Services for teenage parents have been placed in Priority Band 3.

Although services for teenage parents have been placed in priority band 3 for additional funding, given the shortfall in funding for Bamber Court, options for leveraging in additional funding or reconfiguration will need to be considered.

5.3 REVIEW OF GAPS: DEC – MARCH 2007

- Provider Forum – Consultation (December 2007). Teenage Pregnancy: schemes have gone from low demand with vacancies to medium levels of demand with a waiting list. Not a major issue as turnover (resulting from easier move on and lower level support needs of individual clients) means more vacancies arising.
- New service - the Young Parents Support Team (YPST) is a multi-agency/multi-professional group that operates as a virtual team providing information, advice and support to teenage parents, families and other professionals. The YPST has been recognised as a model of ‘best practice’ receiving both ‘Gold’ and ‘Diamond’ Awards for Service Improvement in 2006 from Wrightington, Wigan and Leigh NHS Trust
- Core Strategy Development Group Consultation

- Homelessness Forum Consultation
- Teenage Pregnancy Steering Group – enter Gill’s comments
