

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Board to boost Love-Leigh vision

A prominent business leader has been appointed to spearhead a new group to help oversee investment projects in Leigh town centre.

The Leigh Town Board (LTB) was formed earlier this year with Karen Cox, centre manager of Spinning Gate Shopping Centre, as its chairperson.

The town has been given more than £30m in central government funding and it is hoped this will unlock much more in private investment.

Karen said: "I am honoured to have been invited to become

chairperson. Our role will be to work alongside the council and local partners to develop a 10-year vision for our town and a threeyear investment plan.

"I am really excited to bring representatives from lots of different sectors together to make sure we deliver the best for our town's future."

The LTB will oversee the spend of the government's Long-Term Towns Fund, ensuring it is transparent, accountable and in line with national guidance.

Support campaign is still Here For You

Two-years-on from the launch of Wigan Council's cost-of-living campaign, Here for You, the authority is shining a light on the impact it has had on the lives of individuals across the borough.

Taking a pro-active and targeted approach, the local authority's welfare support team have helped hundreds of residents access more than £1.6m in previously unclaimed welfare benefits.

And in the last year, over £350,000 of support for rent has been distributed to over 970 households through discretionary housing payments.


Throughout the winter months, the council joined forces with local voluntary, faith and community organisations to offer a network of more than 80 warm, welcoming spaces across the borough which saw thousands of visitors.

Over 7,500 children eligible for free school meals participated in holiday activities during Easter, summer and Christmas of 2023 and the council distributed nearly £5.7m in food and fuel support to residents most in need through the Department for Work and Pensions' Household Support Fund.

In the latest phase of activity, specialist advisers have been touring the borough's libraries to offer expert advice and support to help people access financial support they are missing out on.

Fly-tippers targeted as Keep It Clean grows



Fines for fly-tippers have been increased to £1,000 as Wigan Council sends a strong message that environmental crime will not be tolerated.

As part of the borough's Keep It Clean campaign, which recently celebrated its oneyear anniversary, thousands of volunteers have been making a positive impact on the environment across the borough.

And the increase to fly-tipping fines, up from £400, which is the maximum the council is allowed to enforce, is aimed to boost efforts to keep our borough clean and tidy.

Councillor Paul Prescott, cabinet portfolio holder for planning, environmental services and transport, said: "Fly-tipping is a blight on our environment, it creates a hazard for people and local wildlife, and it really damages civic pride.

"We want the message out there loud and clear that fly-tipping is an unacceptable crime and by fining the maximum that we can, we will show offenders that we take this seriously across our borough."

Keep It Clean initiatives included waste amnesties in every ward, an increase to the council's free bulky waste collection offer, installing new bins, working with local volunteers, and a borough-wide campaign to raise awareness of the impact of litter and fly-tipping on our environment.

Around the borough

In Ashton-in-Makerfield,

preparations are well underway for the town's levelling up project. Funding worth £6.6m was secured last year that will help refresh the town centre, improve walking and cycling routes and create community spaces.

The borough's next two Family Hubs are set to open this summer in **Hindley** and **Atherton**. These new facilities will offer a range of services under one roof and will be based at Hindley Nursery School on Mornington Road and Meadowbank Primary School, Formby Avenue, respectively.

As the summer approaches it is a great time to join the weekly walking groups and routes on offer at **Standish** and **Howe Bridge** leisure centres. You can even stay for a brew and a chat afterwards.

The Flashes Festival of Nature returns to **Pennington Flash** on May 25 and 26. A range of activities are available including guided walks, stalls, arts and crafts and more.

Music lovers rejoice as **Aspull** will play host to the Wigan International Jazz Festival, Thursday July 11 to 14. It is one of the highlights of the borough's cultural calendar featuring artists from across the globe. Tickets are on sale now.

In **Golborne**, plans for a new rail station – the first in Greater Manchester for 20 years - have taken a step forward. A business case was submitted to central government earlier this year, following a public consultation that received more than 3,000 responses.

Protect yourself from doorstep crime

Residents are being warned of the risks of doorstep scammers and rogue traders.

On many occasions, it can start with a phone call or knock on the door, but can leave people thousands of pounds out of pocket with sub-standard works to homes or gardens. But there are simple steps to help safeguard yourself.

And you may like to become a neighbourhood champion to help raise awareness in your community.

Ian Kelsall, from Wigan Council's trading standards team, said: "Please use our local Good Trader Scheme. Each trader commits to a code of practice as you can see

how well they have been rated by previous customers.

"Avoid paying all the money upfront and in cash. Paying for a service before it's finished means it's harder to get the money back if the work is sub-standard, or hasn't been completed.

"Reputable traders will be happy to provide you with a written quote and leave it with you, so you have time to think about it.

"Get multiple quotes from different tradespeople and don't be pressured.

"Remember; all responsible contractors should have the facility to accept debit or credit card payments. This matters because

the way you pay for things affects your rights if there's a dispute."

Top names sign-up for town centre regeneration

A redevelopment scheme in Wigan town centre has seen two significant updates since the turn of the year.

Firstly, construction giants Galliford Try were unveiled as the construction partner for the first phase of the project to replace the former Galleries complex.

This was followed a few weeks later with the announcement that major hotel firm, Hampton by Hilton, have come on board for the six-storey, 144-bedroom hotel, which is part of the site.

Wigan Council and its development partner Cityheart are overseeing the regeneration project that includes a new market hall, cinema, leisure facilities, housing, retail and restaurants.

Graham Dodd, managing director development, Hilton UK and Ireland, said:

Wigan Council marks an
exciting new chapter.
We were impressed
by the council and
Cityheart's vision."

Darren Parker, managing director for Galliford Try Building North West, said: "The Galleries project will create a real landmark for the town centre and we look forward to playing our part in creating high-quality facilities for local people."

Rotary Club's big year will include a Believe Star

A Wigan Borough organisation renowned for helping worthy causes will be given a Believe Star in its centenary year.

Wigan Rotary Club turned 100 earlier this month with the bestowing of the star coinciding with its anniversary celebrations.

The community organisation is well known for establishing Wigan and Leigh Hospice in 1983 and has donated hundreds of thousands of pounds to local, national and international

A star unveiling ceremony will be held on a date to be confirmed later in 2024.



Time to attend a TechMates Tea Party!

Wigan Borough residents are becoming safer and better internet users thanks to the council's successful and expanding digital inclusion network.

Figures released to mark Safer Internet Day earlier this year show a significant rise in the number of locals who have been able to access support with online skills.

Regular TechMate Tea Parties, where unsure net users can drop-in for help with all kinds of tech issues, now take place in nine different locations across the borough – with 788 people attending a total of 168 such events in 2023.

Meanwhile, the council-led Digital Communities Partnership has grown to include 29 active partner organisations; assisting a further 1,469 adults last year and signposting 758 individuals to additional digital training and support.

Local volunteers have been at the heart of the TechMates expansion, giving up a combined 390 hours of their spare time last year to help those who are less tech-savvy. Seven of the nine regular Tea Parties are now also exclusively volunteer-led.

Sarah Platt, who hosts weekly drop-ins at Ashton Library, said: "Internet safety is the biggest thing for me; I like knowing that people are safe online. There's a lot of bad things out there and people who are vulnerable or new to the digital age need help to be safe.

"I'd highly recommend being a TechMate. You don't need to know everything; even if you know just a little bit about something that you're passionate about it can take you miles!"

A beautiful place with lots of kindness

t's Lilian Kearsley's 80th birthday and she's spending the day at one of her favourite places: Wigan and Leigh Hospice.

Lilian is one of the charity's longest serving volunteers, with an impressive 27 years of service at the hospice's base in Hindley.

After a busy morning shift answering phones on reception, she finally takes some time to have a cup of tea and slice of birthday cake.

"Everyone here is so kind and friendly," Lilian tells Borough Life. "You really are part of the team." The hospice opened in 1983 and offers care for those who have been diagnosed with a life limiting illness, and support for their families and friends.

Over the years, Lilian, who lives in Hindley, has taken on different roles including supporting events, visiting patients, secretarial tasks, and helping with activities such as card making and flower arranging classes.

"I love being able to speak with the patients. Being here is also a good reminder that there are often people who might be in a more difficult situation than you are. "If I'm worrying about having backache or this and that, I come here, and it can help put my problems into perspective."

Lilian's husband, a Methodist minister, who had originally introduced her to the hospice when he was a chaplain there, has been diagnosed with dementia.

"I like how peaceful it is here," she adds. "Especially in the gardens. It's a place where I can come just for me, to get a bit of peace and independence.

"Things have changed a lot since I first started volunteering here, but it's always meant so much to me."

Wigan and Leigh Hospice relies on more than 400 volunteers like Lilian.

Around 300 work in the charity's 10 shops, but there is always a wide range of roles available.

Care is taken to match a volunteer's skills or interests with the right option for them, whether that is supporting the IT team, or helping to maintain the beautiful gardens.

Joan Rosen, from Abram, has been a volunteer at Wigan and Leigh Hospice for two years.

"I've always been a do-er and one day I was driving to the shops, and I saw the sign for the hospice and decided to call in and ask if they needed any volunteers. I'm so glad I did.

"I used to be a boss, I used to make big decisions in work, but as you get older and everything changes, you start to think you're useless at everything. Being here has given me my confidence back. It's completely changed the way I think and feel."

Joan largely supports the fundraising team, who need to generate £12,000 per day to fund the services the hospice offers.

"I realised I could help the fundraising team with practical tasks, so that they could focus on bigger projects. So, I do anything that's needed, from putting things in envelopes, to helping at events, but I'm very much treated as an important part of the team.

"Being a volunteer is also very freeing because I'm choosing to be here. That's not to say I don't work hard, sometimes the staff have to tell me to go home! But I'm doing it for me, so it feels different to having a job.

"Some people think of hospices as being places where people go to die, so they assume it will be miserable, but it's not like that. It's a beautiful place with lots of kindness. Volunteering here has changed my life."

- Counselling and complementary therapy sessions at the Woodview Centre in Hindley – this includes support for families and friends.
- Education and training for health and social care professionals in Wigan Borough.

Already a multiple world champion, Jane Daniels made headlines this year for her amazing performance at the Dakar Rally. Borough Life caught up with the Standish born speedster.

hether it was tinkering with bikes in the garage of the family home in Standish, or watching her dad, Andy, competing, Jane's life has revolved around motorsports for as long as she can remember.

It was a hobby, that turned into a passion that – after a lot of hard work - saw her forge a successful career.

The 30-year-old has four world-titles to her name in the motorbiking event Enduros, which is an extended cross-country race involving racing through forestry, rock gardens, mx type sections, rugged terrain and over obstacles.

She is one of the most decorated riders on the scene. And it certainly sounds like this was destined from a young age.

"My dad always had motorbikes and I grew up around them," she explains.

"When I was really young, he got me a quad (bike) and I'd go in my grandma's garden or down the fields at the back of our house."

Inspired by dad, a road-racer, and brother Gary (a fellow Enduro competitor) she decided to try off-road racing.

"Dad would follow me around to make sure I was okay, at first. The first race I ever entered (when she was 12) was on a flat track, because my dad thought if she goes off and falls, at least she won't be upside down on a big hill!

"I did that race and I absolutely loved it."

First race ticked off, the track to a motorsports career was clear and Jane was ready to accelerate. In 2012, a friend competed in the first two races of the world Enduro Championship - a concept which was entirely new to Jane.

She was immediately sold on the concept, however, and soon after made her first international trip to Italy.

"It was 42 degrees when I did my first international event, and I drank too much water. I ended up doing the opposite of dehydrating, which is an actual thing; overhydrating.

"My first race went well, I really enjoyed myself, although my body wasn't feeling great and I ended up in the medical tent!"

"I came third on the first day, but then I couldn't start the second day because I was still sick."

But all was not lost.

During that race, a scout for one of the racing teams noticed Jane and she was signed up for the next year.

For the last 11 years, she's completed every season of the World Enduro championships, winning four times.

Her journey has taken her to some extreme locations, and she says this has taught her discipline, resilience, patience and consistency.

All these qualities were required in abundance earlier this year as she competed in the Dakar Rally – a gruelling 8.000km race across two weeks in the Saudi Arabian desert.

She attracted international attention, finishing as the highest placed Britain in the field and the sole female finisher

This was all after a difficult start and after recovering from a crash on day six, and a few more crashes throughout the event.

"It's a truly relentless race that's a real test of your body and your bike; you've got to get both of them to the finish line. You've got to be very consistent and pace yourself, and ride within yourself.

"Every morning you would have two to five hours riding before you start the special stage, and then the same again.

"You'll do six or eight hours in the special stage, and another few hours back to the paddock.

"I actually got into a really good flow. I forgot about racing everyone else and thought, I've just got to enjoy it.

"I'm here to finish and there is no pressure from the team for an outstanding result. I've just got to finish and enjoy it.

"When I kept reminding myself of that, it was way better; I wasn't stressing or making stupid mistakes."

A proud representative of her hometown, Jane was thrilled that her achievement led to a special congratulations from Wigan Borough's first citizen.

An invitation was extended to visit the town hall for a civic reception and Jane, alongside





dad Andy (pictured above), were thrilled to attend.

"Receiving a letter from the mayor of my hometown isn't something that happens every day, we couldn't believe it," she recalls with a beaming smile.

"It was amazing to see the stained-glass windows in the town hall and it was a great day, definitely something we'll remember for years to come.

And this was followed by a special guest appearance at the council's International Women's Day event (pictured above).



The former Standish High School student spoke to a packed-out audience at the Edge conference centre about being a trailblazer for women's motorsport.

"I'm proud of my achievements and I hope I can pave the way for others to start a career in motorsports.

"I've got a lot of people looking up to me, there are a lot of young girls riding in the UK, with a lot more coming through the classes which is a really nice thing to see."

From the back garden in Standish, to the deserts of Saudi Arabia, via many tracks and courses along the way, Jane Daniels is a homegrown champion whose two-wheels are most certainly on the right

We can't wait to see what comes next.

Daniel's journey is an inspiration

Running a marathon and completing an Ironman triathlon are ambitious goals for anyone, let alone a teenager, but 18-year-old Daniel Brennan from Ashton-in-Makerfield is used to overcoming daunting challenges.

Four years ago he was at "rock bottom". Struggling with his weight, his self-esteem and his mental health, he'd all but given up. Today, things couldn't be more different.

"He's changed in every single way," says proud mum Annette. "He's more confident, fitter, healthier; his whole outlook on life has totally changed." The catalyst for Daniel's incredible transformation was Be Well's family fitness team and, in particular, specialist wellbeing instructor Chris Hewitt.

Daniel was already known to Chris having been referred by his GP for weekly activity sessions and advice on nutrition and healthy habits. He'd been making good progress before Covid struck and sent him into a downward spiral.

With the nation in the grip of lockdown, Daniel would spend his days in his bedroom, in his pyjamas, isolated and eating packet after packet of crisps. His mum knew she had to

intervene, and that's when she reached out to Chris to see if he could help.

The pair reunited, albeit virtually this time, with Chris offering guidance and encouragement over video calls to help Daniel get a handle on his unhealthy habits and rediscover a lost love for running and swimming.

"He'd get me to keep a food diary so I'd be accountable for what I was eating," explains Daniel. "Instead of going straight for that pack of crisps I'd have to write it down first, and that made me think about what I was putting into my body."







Chris would also map out weekly exercise plans and set Daniel the challenge of running a mile a day for 30 days. Inspired by his mentor, he ran not just 30 miles but 80.

"I'd always try to do that little bit more, I guess you could say I was doing it to impress Chris. It was Chris who kept me going, because now I wasn't just doing it for myself someone else was relying on me too."

Daniel was soon running weekly Saturday morning 5ks, progressing from there to events such as the Wigan 10k, Wigan Half Marathon, and the West Lancashire Summer Triathlon - and now he's even setting his sights on a marathon, the Ironman 70.3 in Bolton, and a Hyrox fitness race.

His remarkable improvement was recognised at the Believe Sports Awards in November 2022, when he was presented with the Changing Lifestyle Recognition Award.

But in many ways that is just the start of his story; one that continues to

inspire others treading the same path. Not only does Daniel regularly give talks to current family fitness participants, he's now also an official member of the Be Well team as a swimming teacher and lifeguard at Ashton Leisure Centre.

His aspiration? To be the role model he wishes he'd had at the outset of his own journey.

"I know if I had someone to look up to who had been in the same situation. I'd have found it a lot easier to stav motivated to achieve what I wanted – because I'd have known it was possible," he says.

"It makes me happy that I can give the kids a sense that they can achieve what they want to achieve and, although it's a slow process and it seems near impossible, it's actually not.

"It's my way of giving back to Chris and the team for what they did for me, and of helping others who are in the same position I was in to be happy with themselves."

There's a thriving scene of independent businesses bringing a fresh flavour to the high street in more ways than one.

Plus, its historic buildings with their charming architecture, including eye-catching sash windows and intricate mouldings and brickwork, have been lovingly restored.

The Borough Life team couldn't wait to find out more so we paid a visit on a sunny Saturday in April.

Hearty portions, pancakes and more

For speciality coffee and a hearty brunch, Mayhap (below) is a must. Let's just say you'll never find minimalism and Mayhap in the same sentence.

From its vibrant, rustic décor to their modern menu packed full of generous portions served with a slice of good-old fashioned friendly customer service.



We were feeling savoury during our brunch stop-off and went for the chorizo hash; a Mediterranean medley of rich flavours featuring sourdough toast topped with eggs, pesto, spinach, chorizo and potato seasoned with chilli. But it would've been a crying shame to visit and not try one of their popular pancake stacks.

So, the breakfast pancake was promptly ordered and arrived in all its buttermilk fluffiness with a fry-up trio of eggs, bacon and sausage topped with syrup.

Brunch is always better with a side of people watching and it was great to see families, friends and couples with their dogs (yes, it's dog friendly) enjoy this new addition to Tyldesley's high street.

Holistic health for furry friends

The next stop on our Tyldesley tour is The Dogs Deli (pictured right), a natural pet food shop stocking a wide variety of high quality food mainly for dogs but also rabbits, wild birds, hedgehogs and rodents.

Owners Emma and Jon Fernandez established the business in 2016 and are passionate about animals and canine diets.

Only stocking natural products, Emma explained that they're "picky about what we feed dogs" and returning customers mainly shop for the variety of raw food stocked in the freezers.

The Dogs Deli also specialise in holistic health, offering consultations for pet owners that cover canine care from weight management, allergies and even behavioural management all linking to diet.

You'll also find the couple's own brand of high-quality kibble; 'Amigo', the name inspired by Jon's Spanish roots. What sets this kibble apart from most? The higher percentage of meat, which is



nutritionally better for your furry friends. We did spot some products that you may not see in your typical petfood shop, the most peculiar being a deer leg!

There are items you can pick up for yourself too like local chicken eggs, duck eggs and even quail eggs.

Time for a tipple

Thirsty from our Tyldesleytrekking, our next visit was The Markland (pictured above right). This bar is hard to miss with its name adorned in bright lights behind the bar - radiating through the windows and inviting you in.



The vibe feels modern industrial like the bars you might find in Manchester or Liverpool, with dark walls that contrast with exposed brick and stylish lighting.

The Markland is another dog friendly place on this high street, serving a range of beers, ciders and cocktails with a focus on whiskey.

The Markland offers the best of both worlds, perfect for a quiet Saturday afternoon drink but ideal if you're wanting a night out of toetapping to live music and a couple of espresso martinis that might get you up dancing.

Heritage project's impact

If you take a wander down Elliot Street and within Tyldesley's town centre conservation area, the impact of the Heritage Action Zone (HAZ) is clear to see.

Led by community organisation For Tyldesley CIC, the project is approaching the final year of its four-year action plan.

A blossoming idea to spread kindness is a life-saver

I t started out as a kind act of generosity. It very quickly became a lifeline for someone when they needed it most.

Now, this initiative kickstarted by a homegrown borough businesswoman is set to start a wave of positivity across the country.

Sarah McCaig is the founder of Olive Owl, a Wigan-based florists that brings vibrancy and colour to the borough's flourishing cohort of independent traders.

Earlier this year, to mark International Women's Day (IWD), she placed bunches of flowers at various locations to celebrate the brilliant women in her hometown.

But Sarah had no way of knowing just how important this act would prove to be. Shortly after, one of these blooms was discovered at a borough train station by mum-of-three Michaela, who was at crisis point.

Weighed down by suicidal thoughts, the simple message accompanying the flowers resonated with her; an affirmation that she mattered and would be able to ask for help.

This is where the #PetalsofPositivity movement was born.

"When I placed those bunches, I had no idea the impact they would have," explains Sarah.

"I wanted to do something to help celebrate IWD, but they ended up doing something much more in saving a woman's life.

"When I received a message from Michaela about what had happened, I was blown away. I knew immediately that I could do something

Sarah hopes the message of #PetalsofPositivity can become a nationwide mental health initiative and is encouraging her





fellow florists to join in. And her inspirational new friend Michaela (pictured above) is helping to spread the message, as her circumstances will be familiar to many.

"I was really hesitant to share this raw and upsetting time in my life, but my hope is that my vulnerability will encourage others to do the same," Michaela says.

"I had been suffering with post-natal depression and it had spiralled. When you're feeling suicidal, it's almost impossible to think rationally.

"It was something about Sarah's flowers and note that told me I mattered and kept me safe until I felt able to reach out for help.

"I am indebted to Sarah and my kids still have a mother thanks to the kindness she showed that day. I know that #PetalsofPositivity will be a fantastic force for good.

"We're all so busy day-to-day that sometimes we forget kindness and lose sight of what someone may be facing.

"However, it should be number one on our list of priorities because of the incredible impact it can have.




A little bit of kindness can go a long way."

Fellow florists across the UK including floral artists based in Liverpool, Manchester and Birmingham - have signed up to help spread Sarah's message and will be placing free blooms with positive quotations in their communities.

From the day the seed was planted just a short time ago, #PetalsofPositivity has come into bloom at a remarkable rate. But for Sarah, this is very much just the start of something special.

"I am forever grateful that it was Michaela who came across one of the bunches that day and I am in awe of her strength - she's an inspiration to us all," she says.

"I want to use this opportunity to ask other florists up and



down the UK to join me, we're lucky to be surrounded by beautiful blooms every day, and it's a small joy that we can pass onto others.

"Although I recognise it's not going to fix the issues some people are facing, it could just be the lifeline they need to break their mindset and ask for help."

ump-starting your career can be a daunting task, but for dozens of young people new pathways are being created into one of the most rewarding areas of work.

Through borough-wide partnerships with the NHS, Wigan and Leigh College and Edge Hill University, rising numbers of residents are getting the skills they need for a career in social care.

Alex and Ruby are two of the shining stars already making a difference.

For Alex France, a six-month apprenticeship scheme with teams at Wigan Council was his first step on the ladder that has led to a permanent position at The Zone day service at Robin Park.

The 23-year-old worked within the council's supported living service and respite care during his apprenticeship, helping people with learning disabilities and autism.

"It has been a great way to ease into my role and it has been a nice learning experience," he explains.

"Each team has been understanding and offered support and direction.

"Towards the end of my apprenticeship, I applied through the council's Care To Join Us recruitment programme and was successful in obtaining my permanent position.

"It was gratifying to know the team were pleased with my performance when on placement, showing my hard work paid off."

inside-look into the many different areas of social care, but also how residents with complex needs are supported throughout the borough.

"The whole experience so far has not only given me an insight of future careers but has shown me a realistic way of how people are living in our world.

"I found it really interesting learning about the homeless provision, how they are supported and how services help to move individuals into more settled accommodation."

Another route available to residents is Step Into Care, a pre-employment programme, which provides a taster of social care through a mix of classroom learning and on-the-job experience.

The programme provides an excellent opportunity for those interested in social care to gain an understanding of the sector, as well as gain some practical training so that they can make an informed decision about whether it is a career they wish to pursue.

Step Into Care is run in collaboration with the council and is a prime example of the local authority's commitment to fostering local talent.

With these initiatives and several more, Wigan Council is not only creating employment opportunities but also ensuring the provision of high-quality care for its residents.

The delivery of more than 30 new supported living apartments in the last 12 months has placed Wigan Council as one of the leading providers in the country.

The authority ranks second for the proportion of adults with a learning disability who live in their own home or with family. A further 14 apartments are planned to be completed by the middle of next year.

Supported living accommodation gives people their own tenancy, with the support of workers who are onsite should they need them.



Councillor Keith Cunliffe, cabinet portfolio holder for adult social care, said: "These apartments make such a big difference to the tenants who are able to live independently in their own homes, while still having extra support when they need it.

"I could not be prouder of all the hard work by the council's adult social care team, as well as our fantastic partners who have helped to deliver units built to the highest standards."

FAB scheme is creating hundreds of roles

flagship project has seen dozens of young people take the first steps of their career. Launched last year, the Future Apprentices for Business (FAB) programme helps borough firms to 'grow their own' workforce, thanks to grants provided by Wigan Council.

A total of £1.5m has been invested into it so far – following further commitments in this year's budget – and the results are already impressive.

So how does it work? To get involved, a business must have a location in Wigan Borough, employ fewer than 250 people, and be setting up a new apprenticeship employing someone aged 16 to 24 who lives in the borough.

The minimum grant available is £3k, with an enhanced £5k package on offer to businesses who select their apprentice from the council's talent pool of enthusiastic young people who are ready to learn.

Leigh-based solar panel experts Perfect Sense Energy welcomed Cameron onto a Level 3 Digital Support Technician apprenticeship last autumn, with Wigan and Leigh College providing his training.

Technical manager Ryan Thomas (pictured right) is a former apprentice.

"We're keen to offer local people opportunities to join the business where we can, and Cameron (pictured below) is just the latest in a long line," he explains. "I joined the company as an apprentice so that enables me to support from my own experiences and he can see first-hand the great opportunities for progression.

"Cameron has made an ideal start with us, showing passion and willingness to learn. That will stand him in good stead for the future. He's picked up things really quickly and we can't imagine not having him in the business."

Embrace Wigan & Leigh is one of the charities that are part of the FAB network.

They provide support for disabled people and their families. McKenzie (pictured above) joined

their team in 2023, chosen through the talent pool.

"We were looking for an apprentice to help create a more diverse and inclusive team," explains community manager Kate Spragg.

"It's been so rewarding to see McKenzie grow and develop. The support we've received through the FAB scheme has been fantastic and I'd really encourage anyone thinking

about taking on an apprentice to go for it."

Emerging from the big 'shake-up':

The origins of Wigan Borough as we know it today

ittingly, as is the case for most big projects, it all started on a Monday.

Monday, April 1, 1974, to be precise.

The areas now covered by our borough stopped (for administrative purposes) being part of the county of Lancashire and the Metropolitan Borough of Wigan was formed.

Similar changes were happening up and down the country, all because of the Local Government Act 1972.

Five decades down the line, these new boundaries and biggest shake-up of the local government system since the previous century continues to divide opinion.

But what everyone can agree on is the date is one of huge cultural significance for our borough and it provides a chance to reflect on what has been achieved over the last 50 years.

Why did the changes happen?

The Local Government Act 1972 attempted to streamline the local authority system across England and Wales, reducing the number of districts and boroughs (outside of London) from 1,245 to around 400. There was general agreement in Westminster that the structure of local government required changes, although previous reform proposals, prior to the 1972 Act, had not been successful.

It was passed under Edward Heath's Conservative Government of the time and received Royal Assent (final confirmation that the proposals would be taking place) in October 1972.

It created new Metropolitan counties (including Greater Manchester and Merseyside) and elections to the new authorities were held in 1973.

What did it mean here in Wigan Borough?

On a local level, it saw 14 authorities merged into the new organisation.

This included the County Borough of Wigan, the Municipal Borough of Leigh, and the urban districts of Abram, Ashton, Aspull, Billinge and Winstanley, Atherton, Golborne, Hindley, Ince, Orrell, Standish and Tyldesley, and parts of the Wigan Rural District such as Haigh, Shevington and Worthington.

The outputs and services provided by these separate authorities therefore needed to be combined so a working group was set up in the years leading up to 1974 to help with the transition.

It was a huge administrative task, with papers, reports, records and documents needing to be shared from all areas of the borough, many of which are available to view at Archives: Wigan & Leigh.

Many of those services, such as education and schools, housing, libraries, welfare and waste collections, remained the same for residents given that it was only the management of them that had changed. The first elections for the newly formed Wigan Council were held on May 10, 1973, with 72 seats up-for-grabs.

What was being said at the time?

Understandably, the new administrative areas were not wholly accepted by everyone (particularly those who feel strongly about the traditional county identities) and continue to be a source of controversy to this day.

Back in 1974 though, public officials encouraged their residents to embrace the new changes. As recorded in the pages of the Leigh Journal in that first week in April:

"This is surely an historic event in the history of Leigh, but we must not dwell on the past," said Councillor Fazakerley. "We should look to the future and hope those who have been elected to represent Leigh will strive for the best for the town. Leigh has always been a town to be proud of, so let us look to these people to keep up the tradition."

Meanwhile, Atherton representative Councillor Ken Hanney was also quoted in the Leigh Journal: "I started last week feeling slightly depressed at the thought of it being the last one of Atherton Council's existence, but now the depression is beginning to lift."

he formation of Wigan Borough and the amalgamation of the 14 districts meant there was one big task in particular for those in charge of the new authority.

Each of the areas had its own heraldic symbols or coat of arms, each one representing something highly significant about its history.

The new borough would require its own representation though, meaning those tasked with creating it were not short of inspiration.

As tradition dictates, the national College of Arms in 1974 produced the borough's 'new' Coat of Arms, incorporating many aspects of the areas that had joined to form the Wigan Borough.

Progress with Unity

To mark the 50th anniversary, Wigan Council has refreshed the Coat of Arms and from May onwards you will start to see it in many more places around the borough.

The same applies to the motto that was assigned in 1974; Progress with Unity. It

has emerged as a shared vision for the council and its partners and will return to prominence for years to come.

"The formation of this borough is, of course, an important part of our shared history and it provides an opportunity to reflect on the last 50 years," says Councillor David Molyneux MBE, Leader of Wigan Council.

"In preparation for the anniversary, through the work of our teams to reconnect with our traditional crest and banner, the 'Progress with Unity' message is as relevant today as it was then.

"It represents what we're trying to achieve as Wigan Borough; recognising that we have districts, communities and neighbourhoods with their own unique identities but that we're proud of what has been achieved together and will continue to work in partnership in the future.

"Our cultural heritage has always been important to us but this year hands us a unique opportunity to reflect on its significance and how those messages resonate today and for our future."

Wigan Borough officially twinned with Angers in France.



1999

JJB Stadium (now DW Stadium) opened.

2001

Peter Kane Square was opened in Golborne. It was named after boxer Peter Kane, who became the world flyweight champion in 1938 aged 20.



2005

The ruins of a Roman bathhouse was discovered in Wigan.





2008

Leigh Sports Village officially opened by Queen Elizabeth II.

2009

Low Hall, Platt Bridge was announced as the latest nature reserve in the borough.



2012

Heather Frederiksen, from Leigh, wins Gold in the 100m backstroke at the 2012 London Paralympic Games.





2013

Wigan Athletic win the FA Cup with a famous 1-0 victory over a star-studded Manchester City at Wembley.

1974

Wigan Metropolitan Borough is created. Our first mayor was Councillor Robert Matthew Lyons, who stood for Ashtonin-Makerfield.

Wigan Hospice formally opens at the former vicarage in Poolstock. It originally had just five beds.



New exhibition marks borough's history and future

The free exhibition, which will be in place until September, has been curated alongside students from Wigan and Leigh College, using the extensive photographic archive stored at the archives.

Councillor Chris Ready, cabinet member for

communities at Wigan Council, said: "It's really special to be able to mark the history of the whole borough, and the unique identities of its towns and districts.

"The exhibition is a really important part of our year of activities marking the 50th anniversary of the formation of Wigan Borough, since the Local Government Act brought together a host of local government districts.

"The thing I'm most excited for in the exhibition is the fact it will shine a light on the voices and experiences of real people."

Alongside the photographs on display, visitors to the exhibition will have the chance to share their memories and stories in an oral history project which will be shared and also go on to make up part of the Archives' collection.

Coun Ready added: "Archives: Wigan & Leigh is home to over 100,000 images and holds over 800 years of local history.

"We're proud that our team of archivists work all year round and that this exhibition will really bring to the fore the journey we've been on, and help us to progress with unity in the next 50 years."

The project is supported by The National Lottery Heritage Fund and Open Eye Hub.

The exhibition is open at Archives: Wigan and Leigh, Thursdays and Fridays 10am - 4pm, and Saturdays 10am - 2pm.







Set to make history as part of a hero's homecoming

In July, over a five-night stretch at Robin Park Arena, a new chapter is going to be written into the borough's musical history.

More than a quarter of a century since The Verve played their legendary gig at Haigh Hall, Richard Ashcroft returns to his hometown for a two-night special.

Alongside him are local heroes The Lathums, with Noel Gallagher's High Flying Birds and James Arthur completing the line-up of headline acts for the first three days.

For these generational gigs there's even more of a hometown feel, as The Lottery Winners (from Leigh) and Stanleys are also set to take the stage.

The gravity of the event is certainly not lost on Stanleys drummer and vocalist Rob.

"When we saw those gigs announced, it was something we were gunning to play, straightaway," he explains to Borough Life.

"It was a bit crazy at first because you don't see gigs like that going on in Wigan very often, we didn't know what to make of it.

"When Richard Ashcroft was confirmed, we put our name in the hat wherever possible and then getting the word through that we were actually going to do it was amazing.

"To be going on with someone like him, who's so influential to us all as

musicians, it's something extra special and it feels almost historic. As Wiganers, it's an honour."

Stanleys will be showcasing their distinct sound influenced by 60s guitar music and 90s Britpop on Sunday, July 21.

It'll be the second night for the former Verve frontman, as an extra night was swiftly added due to overwhelming demand.

"We all met at Winstanley College, that's why we're called Stanleys, and obviously Richard Ashcroft also went there, so it feels like there's something intertwined with who we are," Rob says.

"Growing up, I started listening to The Verve before I even realised they were from Wigan and then you think of it as like; 'well, these are people like us.'

"It's surreal to think of the Haigh Hall gig, I think we all know someone who was at that one.

"I feel like people are already talking about this one in a similar way. So, seeing our name on that bill, being in the same ballpark. It's crazy, really.

"We're seeing our name on the posters around, on bus stops and things around the town, it just feels really strong as a Wigan band to be alongside Richard Ashcroft."

The Robin Park Festival has the potential to be etched in the borough's cultural history for decades to come and



could represent a highpoint of the thriving music scene of recent years.

The Lathums have made a name for themselves across the world and The Lottery Winners carved out their own piece of history by becoming the first Leigh band to have a number one album.

"We like to speak to all of the bands (on the local scene), we all go out for a drink together," says Rob.

"The Lathums have looked after us and we've always played gigs with bands like the Lottery Winners. It just

and Stanleys are about to go on stage in front of a hometown crowd. How are they feeling?

"You never know, from those big gigs we've done before, how you're going to feel until the day. You might be feeling nervous in the build-up but I think whenever we get to the side of the stage, it's just go time for us.

"It's a good feeling to know that we're going into it confident with our set, knowing it inside and out what it's worth on that stage.

'There's been a great culture of everyone working together with those bands and up-and-coming bands, there's a real tight-knit community'

Robin Park Arena will be transformed for five nights in July

'It's going to be absolutely historic'

For the highly anticipated five nights in July, Robin Park Arena will undergo a major transformation.

It'll be swapping front row forwards for front row seats, extra-time for encores and flying wingers with headline singers. Home to Wigan Warriors since 2019, the main training pitch that usually plays host to Matty Peet's squad in preparation for Super League matches will welcome 11,500 gig-goers per night.

It is set to provide a major boost to the local economy and is hoped to provide a template for future events in the borough.

As part of a collaboration between Warriors, SJM

Concerts – one of the UK's largest concert promoters – and Wigan Council, the Robin Park music series is already putting Wigan Borough on the map ahead of an amazing summer.

"The vision for Robin Park has always been to create a welcoming space where people feel an integral part of our community," explains Kris Radlinski, chief executive of Wigan Warriors and a driving force behind the events.

Since 2019, the Arena's facilities – including a range of sports pitches, athletics track and conference lounges - have been available to the community in addition to providing for the club's first team and academy.

In recent years, the number of visitors using the site has doubled, Kris says, with

the summer music series representing another significant step forward.

"This is a realisation of a goal we've pursued for nearly a decade. We're proud to be working in partnership to bring these prestigious acts to the town," he adds.

"The date of 24 May, 1998, remains etched in the memories of many Wiganers, myself included, as a cultural pinnacle when The Verve electrified Haigh Hall.

"It was a moment that Wigan created as a lasting 'I was there' memory for the town. Fast forward 26 years and one of the most iconic rock n' roll singers of all time, Mr Richard Ashcroft, is set to make a triumphant return.

"I'd like to express deep gratitude to Simon Moran and Steve Walton from SJM for trusting us with the responsibility of hosting this monumental occasion."

To put it simply, for fans of music across the borough, it sounds like it's going to be epic.

We'll leave the last word to Kris: "It's an extraordinary event.
Be sure not to miss this. This is really happening!"
