

Milestone reached for Here for You

A further multi-million pound milestone has been reached by Wigan Council's flagship cost-ofliving crisis support campaign.

More than £5.2m of previously unclaimed financial support has now been accessed by local people thanks to Here for You.

Launched in 2022, the campaign includes a regular community event schedule helping raise awareness of what benefits residents may be entitled to.


The latest milestone includes 370 people who have claimed £2m of Attendance Allowance and more

than 160 pensioners who are now receiving a share of almost £800k through regular Pension Credit payments.

Purple Flag flying high in town centre for the third year in a row

Wigan town centre will continue to proudly fly the Purple Flag after retaining its prestigious international accreditation.

The scheme recognises town centres that meet high standards of safety and offer a vibrant night out for all visitors. Wigan was first awarded Purple Flag status in 2022 as a result of Wigan Council working with partners such as Greater Manchester Police and private businesses.

Overseen by the Association of Town and City Management

(ATCM), Purple Flag requires places to meet a set of rigorous standards, as well as identifying further opportunities to enhance the evening and night-time offer.

Assessors were particularly impressed with the strong partnership working, the focus on regeneration projects and the various safety campaigns.

Councillor Yvonne Klieve, lead member for district centres and night-time economy at Wigan Council, said: "I am absolutely thrilled that we have retained our Purple Flag status. It reflects the hard work undertaken by many council teams, partners and local businesses. All our partners are very passionate about continuously improving the town centre."

Purple Flag – similar to Blue Flag status for beaches and Green Flag for parks – aims to raise the standard and broaden the appeal of town centres.

Reflections on a milestone year



As the 50th anniversary year of Wigan Borough draws to an end, **Dr Tom McGrath** from Archives: Wigan & Leigh reflects on how the events of

2024 will be remembered for years to come.

In the last issue of Borough Life we looked at some of the key moments over the past 50 years which have shaped the borough and the communities within it.

Much of the material we used came from the collections of photographs, newspapers, and official papers held at the Archives.

We care for 800 years' worth of documents relating to the Wigan Borough, and we're always taking in more.

From our point of view, therefore, the 'Forward, Together' exhibition which was co-curated by photography students at Wigan & Leigh College was certainly a highlight of the year.

The students chose archival images, including some of the collection of local photographer Frank Orrell, which were used to showcase how life, work and play has changed, or stayed the same, over the past 50 years.

The exhibition also presented the opportunity to add new items to the archives such as photographs the students had taken of recent events, like the Coronation of King Charles III. We also recorded oral history interviews with residents who witnessed the change in local government in 1974.

2024 was also a year of sporting successes. In recent months, Keely Hodgkinson's star on Civic Square in Leigh was given a golden upgrade. This followed the Atherton born athlete's success on an historic night in August, winning the 800m final at the Paris Olympics.

Keely was not the only athlete from the Wigan Borough to represent Team GB at Paris, as Gregg Warburton, from Leigh, was part of the wheelchair basketball team that won silver at the Paralympics.

There were also multiple celebrations across the year for Wigan Warriors who won the World Club Challenge in February, the Challenge Cup in June, League Leaders' Shield in September and the Super League Grand Final in October.

Two places of reflection were opened at the end of September in Lilford Park, Leigh and Mesnes Field, Wigan. These tranquil spaces were designed for the public to sit, relax and reflect on the years since the COVID-19 pandemic. These sites of reflection are part of a larger project looking back at this period in our history. The Archives established a collection on the pandemic from 2021, which contain diaries, newsletters, signage, and other items from that time.

It was important that these were collected at that time, so that future generations can understand more about that landmark period which we lived through.

Finally, a highlight from the archives recent donations in 2024 was a collection of 13 photographs of Makerfield Mill, Ashton taken by Keith W. Wright in 1991.

These photographs give a

fascinating insight into life in the mill shortly before its closure.

Although only a few decades old, the photographs have already been popular and we have even taken them out to our reminiscence sessions at local care homes to help spark memories.

There are so many other moments to celebrate from across the borough this year; from the Robin Park festival, Flashes Festival, Pride events and Light Night parades, and each will leave its legacy in its own way.

What would you choose to look back on as a highlight of 2024?

Be Well's Gill Healey celebrates with Margaret for her 100th birthday

Margaret brings up her ton with plenty of fun

stley resident Margaret Littler celebrated her 100th birthday in style... with a little help from Be Well.

Just six weeks before her big day, Margaret had been referred for support by the NHS Community React Team as she was unsteady on her feet.

But with a helping hand from Gill, a specialist wellbeing coach from Be Well's active ageing team, she was able to achieve her goal of having a dance at her party. "It was really good," Margaret says of her special birthday bash at Leigh Cricket, Tennis and Bowling Club. "We had a lovely chicken dinner and there was wine on the table, of course!

"There were around 60 of us altogether and they came from all over; Blackpool, the North East, Ireland. It was so good to see everyone.

"We had a DJ and, yes, I did manage to have a dance – though my family insisted on holding both my hands. But I'm not as helpless as I look. If they'd have let go, I would have been raving!" Born 28 September, 1924, Margaret's resilience a century on is remarkable – bolstered by her recent programme of simple, homebased strength and balance exercises (pictured below).

"She's come on so much since I first met her," says



Gill. "When we first met, she was holding on to the dining table to get up from her chair but now she can get up unaided. She is absolutely marvellous for her age."

Gill has come for her latest appointment bearing a bouquet of flowers on behalf of the Be Well team, while Margaret was thrilled to receive a "lovely" birthday card from King Charles and Queen Camilla.

But the greatest gift of all has been her health.

"At my party, my little great granddaughter, who's about six, said to me: 'Grandma, you're 100 years old... and you're not dead yet!' I said 'isn't that good!' and she said 'It's God!'."

Margaret, however, tells Borough Life the secret of her longevity isn't anything as mysterious as divine intervention.

"It's movement," she says. "You know how they talk about 'the joy of movement'? Well, it's true!

"I've always exercised. I used to play cricket, and when the kids were young we used to go skating and swimming. Not that I could really do it... but you have a bit of fun when you can't do it!

"I've always wanted to be fit. I didn't want to be slim, I wanted to be fit. I used to go to the gym until I was 90, and I've always done something.

"The last thing I did for exercise was Tai chi, so that's something I'd like to do again.

"Having Gill come and help me do these exercises has been really important. I still want to be fit. I want to be on the dance floor... not just on the floor!"

Paul's recovery is a proper feel-good story

Resilient resident Paul Sutton is getting his fitness journey back on track - just six months after quickthinking gym staff saved his life.

Paul, 59, suffered a cardiac arrest at Robin Park Leisure Centre in April, seconds after stepping off a treadmill following a 5k run.

Thankfully, Be Well's highlytrained gym team sprang into action to deliver CPR and defibrillator shocks that kept him alive so he could be rushed to Manchester Royal Infirmary for emergency heart surgery.

"I ended up having four stents fitted and I've even got my own defib now, an ICD, in my chest," explains Paul, who'd only joined the gym in February after a high blood pressure scare.

He'd made remarkable progress in the space of two months, going from 17st 8lbs to a much leaner 15 stone through a combination of diet and exercise.

And, after medical reassurance that his heart attack was simply "the luck of the draw", he's determined not to let his setback stop him being healthy and active as he approaches his 60th birthday.

"I did ask the doctor whether I could have been overdoing it but they said no, it was just one of those things and I was lucky I was here when it happened."

All Be Well fitness instructors receive training so they know exactly what to do in the event of such an emergency, and for Robin Park staff Gus O'Donnell, Darren Bibby, Declan Goodfellow, Daniel Hardman and Chris Rigby it proved invaluable.

Paul says: "If it wasn't for their quick thinking I wouldn't be here, so I'm incredibly grateful."

Our Future Ashton

Tell me more...

The £6.6m Our Future Ashton Project, funded by central government, will see exciting improvements to Ashton town centre.

The project will create a new public square with market stalls, introduce greenery and public realm improvements, as well as public art and enhanced shop frontages.

What's the latest?

Public consultation has been taking place during 2024, ensuring residents, visitors, business owners and other stakeholders have their say, which is a crucial part of the plans.

What will I see next?

Publication of the detailed plans are scheduled for the first half of 2025 ahead of construction works getting underway to deliver the restored and revitalised public space.

Cotton Works

Tell me more...

Wigan-based regeneration specialists, the Heaton Group, have launched a masterplan for its £180m regeneration of the 17-acre Eckersley Mill site now known as "Cotton Works" in Wigan as an office, leisure and residential complex.

What's the latest?

With Historic England support, this sensitive conversion of Mill One will transform it into a thriving complex that is perfect for 21st century work.

What will I see next?

Mill One at 'The Cotton Works' will see a food hall and tap room opening on the site next spring, with the upper three floors to be used as offices which will be topped off with a roof top bar and function space. cotton-works.co.uk

Tell me more...

This £135m redevelopment will bring new shops, bars, restaurants, cinema, bowling alley, climbing wall, over 400 new homes, a Hilton hotel and more to Wigan town centre.

What's the latest?

Cityheart and Galliford Try are now building the new 90,000 sqft market hall and rapidly progressing plans for further construction phases.

What will I see next?

Works are well underway for the New Market Hall, bringing employment activity and a variety of trades to the town. See our social media channels for a fly-through of the redevelopment plans.

Leigh

Tell me more...

More than £32m is set to be invested in Leigh town centre over the next decade, including the Market Hall, Civic Square, grants for shopfronts and general public realm improvement projects.

What's the latest?

We have been out talking to local people about their ideas to improve Civic Square, supporting local businesses to apply for shopfront and building grants, and exploring ideas to create more space for pedestrian and cyclists on the town centre road network.

Separately, the council has supported the independently chaired Leigh Town Board to understand the community's priorities for spending £20m Long Term Plan for Towns funding.

What will I see next?

Works on several schemes are set to get underway next year; keep an eye on the council's social media for updates. The Leigh Town Board will be refining proposals for the investment they are leading to reflect new government guidance and gearing up to work closely with community.

Tell me more...

Capital & Centric is spearheading the transformation of the former council office in Wigan into new town centre workspaces.

What's the latest?

Works are well underway and it's set to open in 2025 with lots of features including a coffee shop, mini cinema, a rooftop terrace and office space designed for exciting start-ups and small businesses.

What will I see next?

As the renovations to the building continue, prospective tenants for the office spaces are being encouraged to get in touch. The first workspaces are set to open in 2025. For more information, visit www. capitalandcentric.com/civic

The Fire Within continues to burn brightly

Borough's five-year masterplan to bring arts and culture into the spotlight of centre-stage was launched.

This means that this year all the pioneering work of the cultural manifesto can be viewed from start to finish – and what a journey it has been!

Many of you will be familiar with The Fire Within (which was the title given to the strategy), or, if you're not, there's a big chance you will have visited one of its events or programmes.

From the dazzling scenes of Light Night and the visit of Little Amal to the transformation of Archives: Wigan and Leigh, there have been too many highlights to mention.

There's little doubt that both front of stage and behind-

the-scenes, it has had a huge impact on our borough.

If we rewind back to May 2019, the first chord was played at the Fire Within cultural hub located in what was The Galleries shopping centre.

It was a breathtaking experience walking in for the first time, observing the eyecatching artwork and gazing at the iconic Emoji Stage.

Did you know that bands like the The Lathums, Lottery Winners and Stanleys used it as rehearsal space in their early days ahead of chart-topping, headlining big gig glory?

"I've never seen anything like this before," was one line of feedback that summed up the views of many. The Fire Within HQ had started the buzz and was putting the borough on the map. Continuing along the musical theme, if we view the HQ as the lead singer that was initially taking the limelight, the community outreach aspects of the Fire Within plan was the rhythm section driving everything forward.

Since 2019, more than £36m of external funding has been secured to boost programmes across the borough. And in 2021, Arts Council England named Wigan Borough as one of only seven Priority Places in the North West, which brings a focus for additional national investment and engagement.

So, what was the result of all this? Well, let's break it down.

The increased investment and ambition have meant key facilities such as Archives: Wigan and Leigh, The Turnpike Gallery and Leigh Spinners' Mill

For more than a year, the hall has been hidden underneath its scaffolding while its transformation and vital works to the roof and external façade take place.

Soon, the scaffolding will come down as the project moves into its next phase where plans for inside the hall will be developed alongside our partner, AtkinsRealis.

Our dedicated multi-disciplinary teams continue to work hard to make the ambitions at Haigh a reality.

Did you know? AtkinsRealis, the renowned engineering firm who are leading on Haigh's internal design, recently won the Stirling Prize for their work on the Elizabeth Line in London. This prestigious annual award recognises the UK's best new architecture.

Horticulture plans blossom



Amphitheatre for a Tree

You might have noticed some changes by the hall already.

Multi-award-winning landscape architect and local resident, Michael John McGarr, has provided the vision for a new formal garden called Amphitheatre for a Tree (pictured above).

Rooted in symbolism, nature and community, with layered seating surrounding a tree set to amplify breathtaking views across the town, the focal point of the garden is a Handkerchief Tree which was kindly funded by Wigan Rotary Club as part of its centenary year celebrations.

The inspiration behind the garden was an 18th century painting of Sir Roger and Lady Bradshaigh at Haigh Hall which illustrated formal gardens and beautiful landscaped stepped lawns with amazing views.

Restoring the walled gardens

Head of horticulture, Dr Sylvia Travers, is working hard with a team of gardeners, volunteers and students to breathe new life into the estate's Victorian gardens, bringing them back to their former use.

The inspirational horticultural vision will see the kitchen garden grow to feed local people once more through the hall's future hospitality offer.

In the walled garden, and pending planning permission, new glasshouses (pictured below) will become home to community events including horticultural, social, learning and commercial opportunities.





Play trail will be out of this world...

Children and adults alike will be sure to enjoy a brand new play trail inspired by Haigh's strong links to astronomy as it opens at the end of 2025.

With the help of more than 80 local school children, the play trail has been developed by artist David Bethell. It will feature giant comets (pictured below) that can be climbed on and explored.

Also due to open in 2025, a Woodland Hub offering outdoor adventure activities – plus a coffee kiosk for your caffeine hit – will bring a currently underused part of the estate back into use by encouraging visitors.





Plantation Gates



Plans to restore the Grade II* Plantation Gates and Lodge works are expected to be underway by the end of 2024, offering a focal point for visitors entering the grounds of the estate from the Royal Albert Edward Infirmary side of Haigh Hall.

Mowpin Lodge Gates



The design was in your hands, and you chose one which reflected Haigh's 900-years of rich mining heritage.

The gates, featuring a miner's shovel and pickaxe, were cast at the end of 2023 at the local Haigh Foundry – quite a remarkable sight.

The new gates will be installed at Mowpin Lodge entrance in the coming months.

Bothy yard and cottages

Funded by The National Lottery Heritage Fund, the old Bothy cottages will be restored to create a multi-use community space.

The outdoor area (pictured below) will support horticultural activities and a revamped pavilion will offer more opportunities in this section of the grounds that was once the Haigh zoo.

Repairs to the ornamental pond and priority upgrades to the footpath network will also form an important part of this project.

All aboard the Woodland Railway!

In September, Wigan Council announced plans to invest £380k to get the popular woodland railway back on track since its temporary closure in 2020.

The railway first opened back in 1986 and takes a 1.6k route through the upper plantation woodlands at Haigh. When it was last open in 2019/20, it carried more than 20,000 passengers – so we know it's a much-loved attraction.

A snapshot into care

I n every corner of our communities there are unsung heroes making a big impact in the lives of those around them.

They make a valuable contribution, putting a smile on the faces of those they care for and consistently placing others above themselves.

Careers in the adult social care sector can be challenging, often supporting elderly and vulnerable individuals.

But they are also hugely

rewarding, and our borough could not function without the dedication and commitment of our carers.

Throughout the care sector in this borough alone, there are many roles and responsibilities across a wide-range of different settings and locations.

Likewise, there are many different routes into these rewarding careers.

And that's why Wigan Council and its partner organisations have a number of tailormade schemes available that are helping our residents gain the skills and experience they need.

In the following pages, the Borough Life team meets with five dedicated individuals who perform different roles and have had varied introductions to their careers.

We asked them what they value about their jobs and why they would recommend what they do to others, to provide a snapshot into life in a caring role.



Shauna Barton

Shauna Barton, 36, is the CEO of
Care Choice North West and has

Inspired by her mother who was a support worker in Wigan, Shauna's passion for care began at 14.

"The incredible impact my mother had as part of the lives of the individuals she supported gave me the desire to help people," she explains.

Starting as a carer with no business experience, she founded Care Choice North West in 2015. Today, it is one of Wigan's largest care companies with 250 staff.

Shauna has proudly completed numerous qualifications and is pursuing a diploma in leadership and management.

"I am dyslexic and have ADHD; I view my unique perspective as a strength that enhances my ability to lead a company that delivers exceptional care.

"The joy of seeing the smiles of the individuals we support is profoundly rewarding and I credit the success of Care Choice to my dedicated team.

"Many people think care is solely about personal assistance, but I believe it goes much deeper.

"It's about changing lives and experiencing personal growth."



Warren Porter

Warren Porter, 36, is a support worker at Cherish UK and has been working in care for almost three years.

"The best bit about the job is seeing people I support smile when I arrive," he explains.

"You really can make a difference to someone's life by just being there for them."

For Warren, the biggest myth about working in care is that it means dealing with 'difficult' people.

"They are just people in the community like you and me who want to enjoy every day as best they can," he says.

"I would recommend this job for anyone who wants to make a real difference in their community and isn't interested in the boring nineto-five job sitting behind a desk all day."

Gemma Raymond, 39, is a Team Leader at CareTech with eight years of experience.

CareTech is an organisation that provides supported living help for residents, helping them to live as independently as possible.

Her journey began by helping her family, which inspired her to pursue a career in care.

"One big myth about working in care is that it is all about doing things for the individuals," she says.

"This is not the case at all. I am very privileged in my role to be able to support both the individuals and the staff to have positive outcomes every day."

Gemma told us that her favourite part of the job is that no two days are the same and she is able to help people she supports to live their best lives.

Natasha Sharp, 35, is a dementia support worker at the Heathside Residential Home in Leigh.

She is part of a dedicated and highly-skilled team at the Plank Lane facility that supports around two dozen older people and also provides a reablement service.

"I find it very rewarding; I love supporting our residents," she explains. "I know I am making a difference to people's lives and helping others. It's not just personal care, we're able to have fun and encourage our residents with activities, such as dancing. We give comfort and are like a family."

Natasha has been working within the care sector for two years. She would recommend it as a career because of the experience of making that important difference in someone's life.

Dane Ramsdale, 32, is a Mobile Support Worker with Wigan Council with three years experience.

"I got into care as I wanted a career change after working in retail for 16 years," he explains. "I knew care would be the best move after being told by many people that I should go for it."

A mobile support worker is a real all-rounder, helping residents in a variety of ways across a range of care settings.

It didn't take long for Dane to appreciate just how fulfilling the job can be, feeling like he is making a difference every day and seeing the smiles on people's faces.

It is a career he would recommend to everyone.

"It's very rewarding and can make you feel great, especially when you have made a real positive impact to someone's day.

"There is nothing better than helping and supporting people whilst gaining valuable life skills along the way.

"Care workers have high levels of emotional intelligence which allows them to listen, engage with people and build relationships."

For those still at school and considering their options, Wigan and Leigh College offers a range of qualifications. All include work placements with local employers with lots of options.







Taking steps towards a brighter digital future

• or several years dedicated teams in Wigan Borough have been helping thousands of residents unlock their digital skills.

It's not only helping people build their confidence with technology that can support them with their everyday lives, it's also tackling social isolation and building new communities.

One such project is the ground-breaking Building Opportunities programme.

"It's not necessarily about getting qualifications," explains Josh Hill, a digital inclusion project lead at

the Rebuild With Hope Foundation.

"It's about re-engaging people, bringing them back into the community and helping those who might have become isolated to get out and about again.

"It's a safe space to meet others, get informed and build confidence."

The Rebuild With Hope (RWH) name will be familiar for those who have visited their flagship store in the heart of Wigan town centre.

Building Opportunities is a programme run by the RWH Foundation – the charity behind the store - offering

opportunities for digital inclusion.

Josh and colleagues are part of the Digital Communities Partnership, a group led by Wigan Council but made up of a selection of local organisations all focused on improving the borough's digital skills.

"The digital world is now hard to ignore," he says. "If you want to move your money, you'll need an app. Many will even need an app to request holidays at work.

"It you haven't grown up with this technology it can be a daunting task. And, it's everevolving.

"Even people who have taken the time to educate themselves previously can feel left behind when the technology moves on."

Building Opportunities offers workshops, mentorship programmes, skills development sessions and practical training. The training covers basics such as getting the best out of your mobile or how to use a laptop or tablet for e-mails, through to more complex skills.

At a recent session, Josh teamed up with Wigan Council's Digital Wigan team who brought along their virtual reality headsets for everyone to try, both for entertainment purposes and basic confidence building.

"The number of completely digitally excluded people is reducing," says Josh. "But most people are probably a little bit digitally excluded in some way.

"For example, you might be able to make a brilliant video on your mobile phone but might not know how to use the in-built mouse on your laptop, or you might be great with e-mails, but struggle when it comes to ordering a food shop online.

"The training isn't about creating digital wizards; it was about helping everyone get by in daily life."

Stephen Kelly, a warehouse supervisor, joined one of the sessions to learn new skills.

"I live in a first floor flat with my sister," he says. "But she's recovering from a hip operation, and she really needs to be on the ground floor.

"I'm looking after everything for her and it's all online now; looking for a new flat, renewing prescriptions.

"In the future I'd like to progress at work, possibly into management, but a lot of training is online, and I'm sick of paying to print things off."

At the end of this course, the Digital Wigan team gifted the participants with reconditioned laptops that had been provided through funding from the Device Bank at the Good Things Foundation.

Other community initiatives across the borough will also be receiving the free laptops over the next few months.

"This training and now the laptop will make a massive difference to me," Stephen adds. "I'll be able to do so much more from home."

Fellow group member Mark Armstrong is a musician who says he has previously not been comfortable with modern technology.

"I've always hated it," he says. "I was never interested in it at school. I don't even have a TV or radio."

Mark was drawn to the **Building Opportunities** programme initially through the yoga and mindful meditation courses.

The friendly, informal atmosphere of the group encouraged him to complete the digital course, much to his own surprise.


