1)	How many incidents regarding damage to a vehicle caused by potholes were reported in the year 2019-20?	126
2)	How many incidents regarding damage to a vehicle caused by potholes were reported in the year 2020-21?	56

- 3) How many incidents regarding damage to a vehicle caused 90 by potholes were reported in the year 2021-2022?
- 4) How many incidents regarding damage to a vehicle caused by potholes were reported in the year 2022-2023
- 5) Do you have a target repair time for repairing a pothole once it has been reported?

This response time is determined by a risk-based approach as follows:

Priority 1 is – 2 hours Priority 2 is – 24 hours Priority 3 is – 14 days Priority 4 is – 28 days

6) How many potholes/defects were repaired by the council in each of the following years - 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022?

We do not hold information on 'pot-holes' repaired. However, the total number of all types of carriageway defects that were repaired is:

- 2019 4,761
- 2020 3,623
- 2021 4,328
- 2022 3,326

7) How much has the council spent repairing potholes in the following years - 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022?

We do not hold information on the cost of repairing 'pot-holes' only. However, the total cost for repairing all types of highways defects (carriageway and footway) is:

- 2019 £926,806
- 2020 £976,480
- 2021 £740,315
- 2022 £604,430
