

I note that a significant amount of the defects in the highway occur at the sites of reinstatements following highway works/utility works. Repairing these defects must be a significant drain on council resources and taxpayers money.

- 1) Where a person/contractor/utility company conducts work on and highway adopted to by the authority what are the minimum standards / specification to which the highway must be reinstated? Please give details of materials (i.e. Bitmacs, aggregates, sealants etc), treatments (stabilising, top dressing, lineing etc) and processes (compaction, installation of bitmac).
- All reinstatements need to be in line with The Specification for the Reinstatement of Openings in Highways – 4th Edition.
- 2) To put this question a different way, if I wished to open the highway to what standard would I be required to reinstate it?

- 3) Must reinstatements be warranted/guaranteed? If yes give details of length and minimum conditions.
