1a. What work has been carried out to "decolonise" collections: addressing colonial legacies, racism, and to make the museum more racially inclusive (for example, what labelling has been added to contextualise potentially harmful narratives about slavery etc) Wigan Museum's current 'What's in Store' exhibition showcases objects and artefacts from the collections – the project has included consultation with the local community about how the museum uses and develops its collections and what stories it should tell moving forward – this has included a workshop with the councils' Equality and Diversity Advisory Group which includes representatives from global majority community groups.

Wigan Museum's 'New Perspectives' project is working with Global Friends - a youth group for young people from different ethnic backgrounds, to develop new narratives around the collections to be shared in new digital interpretation.

The culture service develops programme content to align with Black History Month.

2a. What work has been carried out to make collections, events and education work to make it more inclusive for the LGBTQ+ community? Tours, new displays, new labels? Wigan Museum's current 'What's in Store' exhibition showcasing the collections has included LGBTQ+ material from the collections and representation within the consultation undertaken as part of the exhibition. The museum also actively collects ephemera from each annual Wigan Pride.

The Culture Service supports the planning of Wigan Pride every year and host a variety of associated events on site and supports the Youth LGBTQ+ group B-YOU, to curate a young person's stage at Pride.

The Turnpike Gallery host a weekly arts group for neurodivergent LGBTQ+ young people called 'Explorers Leigh', in 2023 this group worked with Archives: Wigan & Leigh to co-curate a small display at Leigh Town Hall.
