1. Introduction

Wigan is a metropolitan borough of Greater Manchester and is the most north western in Greater Manchester. It has borders with other Greater Manchester boroughs, Cheshire, Merseyside and Lancashire and occupies an enviable geographic position, lying between the major cities of Manchester and Liverpool on the West Coast Main Line surrounded by the motorway network including the M6, M58, M61 and in close proximity to the M60 and M62. With a growing population estimated at 317,800 people, it is also the 9th largest metropolitan borough in England covering an area of 77 square miles (200 km²).

Wigan experienced dramatic expansion during the industrial revolution with the development of major mills and a coal mining district. The historic towns and villages which grew during this period punctuate the landscape and residents enjoy a significant 'greenheart' area, with 70 percent of Wigan's 77 square miles consisting of expansive countryside. Spanning the length and breadth of the borough, this area includes stunning parks, woodlands, wetlands, canals and green space, rich in flora and fauna.


Wigan has a strong sporting tradition, embedding passion and belief within the fiercely proud local population. The amateur sports scene is particularly prevalent in Wigan and Leigh, with a wide range of sports clubs ensuring that people are able to engage in regular physical activity to improve health and wellbeing.

Leigh Sports Village (LSV) is a pioneering multi-sector development venue which provides state of the art facilities for sport, physical activity, education, health, and leisure that serves the whole community. The centrepiece of the development is a 12,000-capacity stadium, home to professional rugby league team Leigh Leopards and Manchester United Women's and Under 21's football teams.

Leigh Sports Village has a very rich history, as it has had the privilege of hosting a multitude of different international sporting events from two Rugby League World Cup events in 2013 and in 2022, to the UEFA Women's Euros in 2022 and most recently, the finishing line for the Women's Tour of Britain in June 2024. The stadium has also hosted two concerts in recent years, one featuring Sir Elton John in 2014 with over 17,000 attendees and Lionel Richie in 2018. The stadium is a very versatile

space as it also provides the perfect location for all conferences, meetings, weddings, events and more!

Also located onsite is the Leigh Sports Village Arena, which is the region's premier artificial grass sports complex, the Leigh Harriers & Athletics Club, home of Olympic champion Keely Hodgkinson which boasts full-sized athletics track and grass pitch, with our latest addition to the complex being Leigh Youth Hub, which was created by young people, for young people.

4. Background to the Requirement

To ensure the teams who call LSV home and to continue to host international events, our experienced ground staff are wishing to enhance the playing surface of our main pitch to consistently meet the demands of topflight and international competition.

To assist with this process LSV are looking for a single supplier who can provide a pitch lighting rig, complete with variable light spectrum bulbs along with a training provision that meet the requirements set out below. Leigh Sports Village are wishing to purchase new equipment only, previously used equipment will not be considered.

Introduction

Provide LED Lighting and Heating rigs for the purpose of pitch growing at Leigh Sports Village (LSV). This tender is for the lights, heat source, frames, power connections and all require ancillary equipment to promote the repair and growth of healthy grass on our multi-sport surface.

In addition to the initial purchase of the lighting and heating system, the ongoing services will be required as follows:

- Annual or regular servicing
- Call out service (repairs)
- Refresher training
- Pitch Monitoring Systems (to be priced included or individually as extra's where applicable)

The 'rigs' must be robust enough to be moved on a regular basis and operational in an outdoor environment for very long periods of time. They must also be able to be moved by hand by ground staff as required.

The aim of purchasing this equipment is to create the best grass playing pitch possible, with a little as possible light pollution and our overall co² consumption.

4.1 Light and Heat

The product is required to promote the healthy growth of the plant; including all elements such as the leaf and the root structures.

- The light source should be LED and should provide the correct variable spectrum to promote healthy growth.
- The heat source should also be suitable to promote healthy growth.

4.2 Power Consumption

LSV currently use sodium-based rigs which provide both light and heat, this equipment uses a high level of energy. LSV require a product that is energy efficient, and suppliers will be required to evidence the savings detailed in

the pricing schedule. Supplied below are the current energy costs to assist interested parties in providing a cost saving response within the pricing schedule Part B) and narrative in Section B (Value for Money) of the ITT

Day Rate – 18.00248 per kWh

Night Rate – 17.00662 per kWh

We would like each tendering party to outline the expected annual power consumption of their system. Each company will be expected to show the consumption of their product, using one or both of the required Light and Heat parameters.

4.3 Size and Number of Rigs (variable)

The Ground staff at LSV have supplied the configuration below; in their experience would best meet the needs of facilitating the optimum growth of both root and plant on the pitch

- 6 large rigs including variable light spectrum bulbs to cover between 2500m2 and 3000 m2
- 4 small rigs including variable light spectrum bulbs to cover approximately 200m2
- 2 small rigs including cover/canopy and variable light spectrum bulbs to cover 100m2
- 1 small rig including variable light spectrum bulbs to cover 14m²

We are open to conversations around the number of rigs as longs as the square meterage is achieved.

The pricing schedule included in the tender documents allows for interested parties to cost on the above configuration or an alternative configuration.

4.4 Maintenance and Repair

LSV will require regular maintenance and annual servicing for the supplied Rig and Variable Light Spectrum Bulbs.

The stadium hosts both Rugby and Football matches, often with limited time between games in the schedule. Therefore, we require a supplier who can provide excellent Customer Care and timely resolution to any faults when they occur, to ensure we keep our surfaces at optimum levels without impacting on our schedule.

It is expected any identified issues to be resolved within 48 hours from point of contact.

We will require the products supplied to have robust warranties.

4.5 Training

The LSV grounds team will require robust and in-depth training at the point of delivery and throughout the lifetime of the equipment to understand the use and care of our chosen system. This will maximise the efficiency of the product as LSV.
