## B5215 – Market Place Scheme "You Said, We Will"



The Major Projects Team engaged with stakeholders on the proposals for the future of the B5215 – Market Place from 23rd April to 16th May 2025.

The engagement was completed via varying methods including:

- Online consultation on Citizenlab
- letters to residents and businesses
- large scale-designs displayed at Leigh Turnpike and Library
- promotion via the Council's social media platforms.

You asked for more seating at the proposed bus stop to prevent people from sitting on the Church walls.	As part of the scheme, we will move the bus shelters near to St. Mary's Church closer to Civic Square, to create a safe, bustling, attractive waiting environment for public transport.
	We will be installing additional seating and rest points on the Civic Square to enjoy the new space.
You raised concerns if the removal of existing traffic	We will not be removing any existing traffic signals.
lights would create speeding motorists.	We will be upgrading the existing crossing at Lord Street and installing a new crossing near Church Street.
You asked more information about the crossing points and whether one single direct crossing could be included.	The design has been amended from a staggered crossing to include a direct crossing point, which will remain close to the Church Street junction. We will also be upgrading the existing crossing point at Lord Street.
You asked if we could remove the bus lane.	Unfortunately, removing the bus lanes is not an option. However, we can improve traffic flow by removing the bus stops on the southern approach to the Lord Street junction. This change would help ease congestion and allow vehicles to move more freely through the junction.
You want to see the artwork on the central reservation retained.	We will look to relocate the central reservation artwork in the vicinity of the road or Square, and speak to your local Councillors to confirm a suitable location for moving.
